WEST SIDE HIGH WINS FIELD BATTLE

Captures Annual Track Meet by Narrow Margin Over P. A. and H. M. A.

RELAY RACE DECIDED WINNER OF THE DAY

Portland High Gets 36 Points, Portland Academy 33 and Hill 31—Hill Runners Disqualified in Half Mile—One Record Is Broken.

The second annual intercollegiate track and field meet, held yesterday afternoon on Multnomah field was won by Portland High school, its team gaining 36 points. Portland academy, which was not expected to show up very well in the meet, won second place with 31 points to its credit.

Some very good records were made especially in the track events. Sam May of Hill Military made a new intercollegiate record for Oregon in the 440 yard run. Very good time was also made in the 100-yard dash, the 220-yard dash and the mile run.

Probably the prettiest, as well as the most interesting race, was the half mile relay, which was won by the team from Portland High school. It was composed of Meier, Dart, Latourette and Woodard.

The relay decided the meet. Had Portland academy won this event first place would have gone to her and second to the high school.

In the 880-yard run three men were disqualified. May of H. M. A., who easily won the event in the time of 2 minutes 24 1/2 seconds, was disqualified because one of the H. M. A. boys paced him for about 50 yards. Gammons, who came in third, was disqualified for the same reason.

Reynolds of the high school, who came fourth, turned out of the course before he got to the finish. Had it not been for this he would have been given first place. Because of these disqualifications Baird, who came in next to May, was given first place, and the second and third places were left vacant.

The Portland high school had no particular star, but they have a team to be proud of, because of their good all-around athletes. In both the 880 and 1200-yard hurdles P. H. S. took first and second places, giving them 16 points in these two events.

Glass of Portland academy did the best work for his school by winning three first places. He won the 100-yard dash, the 220-yard dash and the broad jump.

Taylor of Hill Military was the star of his team, winning first place in every event in which he was entered. Prehn of Star High also made a very good showing.

To the winner of the meet is given a championship banner and to the winner of each event is given a bronze cup.

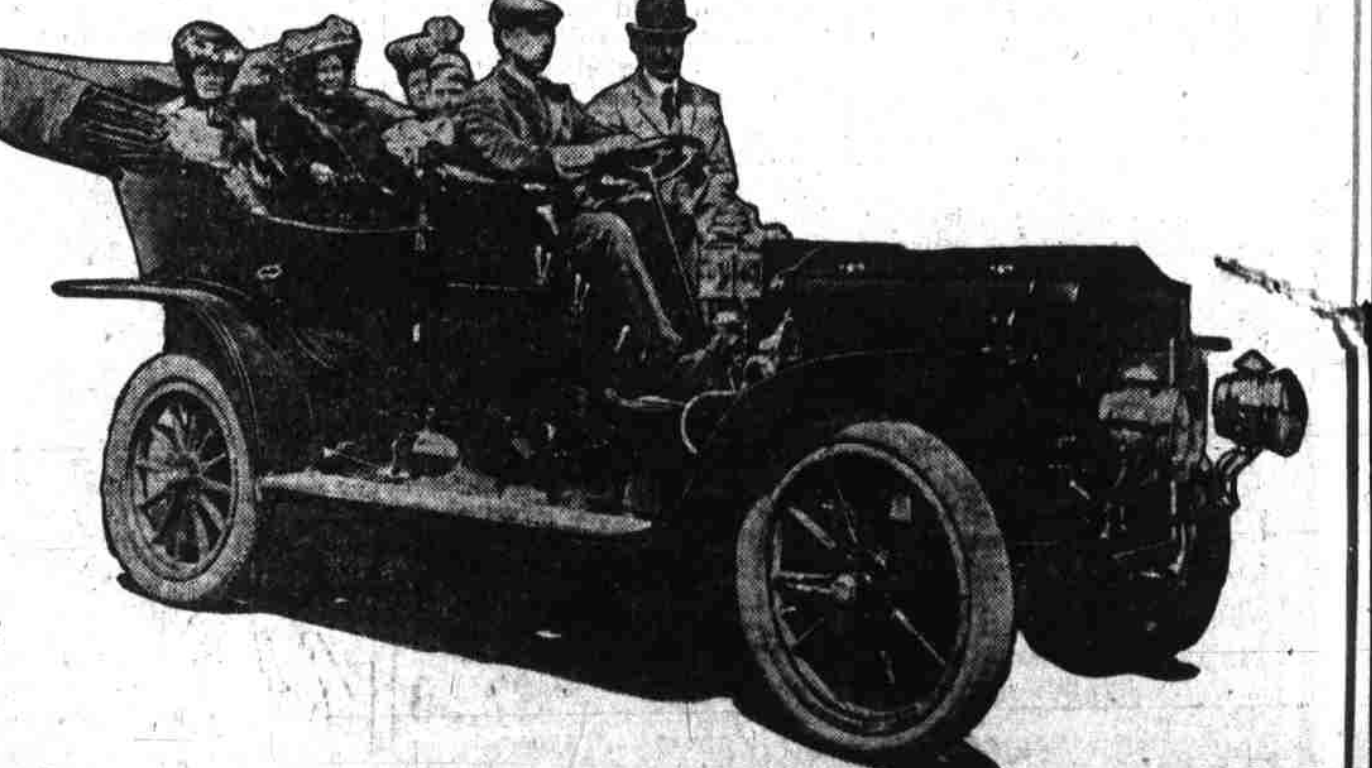
