

\$2,000,000 BOND MONEY DEPOSITED

Indicted Millionaires Appear and Furnish Securities to Court, Schmitz Trial On

Ruef Now Laboring Under Hundred and Seventeen Accusations and Schmitz Under Thirty-Six—Bond Companies Growing Timid.

(Journal Special Service.) San Francisco, May 27.—Four of San Francisco's reputed millionaires, and three others appeared before Judge Coffey this morning and gave bonds on indictments found Saturday. They were Eugene DeSaba, John Martin and Frank Drum of the San Francisco Gas and Electric company, and Mayor Eugene Schmitz indicted on charges of bribing supervisors on the gas rate deal, and G. H. Umbsen of the Parkside Realty company; J. E. Green and W. I. Brobeck, attorneys for the Realty company, the latter being charged with Ruef with bribing the supervisors to grant a street railway franchise.

Ruef is now laboring under 117 indictments. Schmitz has 36. Bond money to a total of \$2,000,000 is now in the hands of Judge Coffey on the total indictments found. So many indictments have been found that many of the local bonding agencies are refusing to take further risks.

No personal arrests were made in any case this morning. The indicted men appeared before Judge Coffey and quietly submitted sureties.

Anticipating that the jury box in the Schmitz trial will be finally filled today, an unusually large crowd was in attendance at the morning session. The 14 additional indictments found against Schmitz Saturday apparently did not disturb the defendant's Sunday rest, for he laughed and joked with his attorneys.

Before the examination of talesmen was resumed, the case of Theo Halsey, accused of bribing supervisors to help the Pacific States Telephone company was called and put over a day.

Otto Ferrenbach was the first talesman examined. He admitted that he made handbooks on races and was charged by the state on the ground that he was conducting a business that needed police protection. The charge was resisted by the defense, but was sustained by the court.

Veterans of Two Wars Observe Day by Holding Special Church Services.

Members of the G. A. R., Spanish War Veterans and the Third regiment and battery of the Oregon National Guard united yesterday in annual observance of Memorial Sunday. Kavanaugh delivered the orations, and they made a profound impression on the audience. Chaplain Henry A. Bordin of the Department of Oregon, G. A. R., offered prayer and was joined by the audience in reading from the scriptures.

"America" and "Nearer My God to Thee," with two organ selections and "Taps," formed the numbers on the musical program, which was given under the direction of Professor W. H. Boyer with Miss Margaret Lamberson accompanying. The regimental band led the march from the armory to the church.

In Grace Baptist church at Montavilla yesterday memorial services were held under the auspices of Ben Butler post, G. A. R., with a large attendance. A splendid musical program was rendered and Rev. Gilman Parker delivered a stirring sermon. The decorations were unusually attractive.

How escapes from serious accidents by falling trees.

At one time the flames threatened disaster to a residence district which adjoins the track that was burned. A costly residence is situated only 100 feet from the edge of the burned district and upon it firemen concentrated their energies for a time. They succeeded in preventing it from igniting and also saved other nearby residences. The amount of damage has not been estimated. The loss consists only in burned fences and destroyed trees and underbrush.

SCHOOLS WILL USE 18,000 CORDS

Supplies Committee Receives Various Bids for Furnishing Winter's Fuel.

Four bids for supplying in the neighborhood of \$80,000 worth of fuel to the 31 schoolhouses in the district were opened by the supplies committee of the city school board Saturday afternoon. Two of the bidders offered to supply slabwood, one offered to furnish cordwood and the fourth would warm the pupils with coal. Eighteen thousand cords of wood are thought necessary for the district this year in order to guard against a possible stringency in the market later in the season.

Two hundred cords will be required by the Hawthorne, Shattuck and the East and West Side High schools, each building being provided with that amount. The smallest number of cords will be used by the Fernwood school, to which has been apportioned 10 cords.

The Oregon Fuel company's coal bid ranges from \$6.75 to \$8 per ton, the highest price being applied to the Failing, Peninsula and Portsmouth schools, and the lowest to the Shattuck and Clinton Kelly. The possible stringency in the market later in the season.

Churchley Brothers want to provide 10 of the schools with cordwood at prices ranging according to the location of the school buildings from \$5.25 to \$5.95.

Four-foot slabwood will be sold to the school board by the Bandfeld-Vesey Fuel company for from \$3 to \$3.50 per cord for green wood and from \$2.50 to \$3.25 per cord for seasoned wood.

A bid was submitted from the Portland General Electric company, which would supply all of the schoolhouses with slabwood at \$3.75 to \$4 per cord, locations of the buildings accounting for the difference in price. However, no certified check could be found in this bid and it will probably not be formally considered.

afterwards filled in, which dangerous method, it seems, has been the regular custom in one department for many years, such signed in blank requisitions being kept and issued from the auditing department itself without the fact having come to the knowledge of the auditor, so it is said.

Special Committee Investigates.
This extract from the mayor's message brings up the work of the special committee which was put out of existence before it had an opportunity to complete its report and make it public. The ways and means committee had made its report criticizing the mayor for having put the city to the expense of auditing the books of the auditor's office and holding that nothing had been discovered which would cast any shadow of doubt or inefficiency on the management or conduct of that office, the special committee was appointed by the council.

Had been made in the city books with advice presumably for the purpose of protection, that large sums of money had been paid for supplies, especially to the crematory, for which no requisitions could be found and that the system of issuing receipts was unsatisfactory and unreliable for matters of record.

The special committee began a series of hearings, all testimony being taken by a stenographer, Miss Julia Maxwell.

The hearings were conducted by W. T. Vaughan, chairman of the special committee.

Devlin Makes Report Himself.
The committee found, by Mr. Devlin's testimony, that the city auditor had himself written the report of the ways and means committee which had practically caused the boxes to be exposed. Mr. Devlin admitted having written the report which was afterward copied by his stenographer. He related that he had made notes of the opinions of the different members of the ways and means committee and had then compiled the report. He also admitted that he had not been instructed as to the definite language of the report or its detail, but that he had put in the phrases and language condemnatory of the mayor and of the expiring done.

The hearings developed the fact that bills were made out and paid by the auditor's office without the authority of a recorded requisition in many instances while in most of the instances where the requisitions were on file they had been made by deputies in the auditor's office and not countersigned by the heads of the department desiring the material.

Other irregularities just as glaring were discovered by the committee and in the midst of the investigation the council called for an immediate report. Miss Maxwell, the stenographer, the report could not be given and the committee was discharged without being given an opportunity to make public its findings.

There is little chance of completing the jury this week. As soon as the venire is exhausted an adjournment will be taken until Wednesday. There will be no session Thursday.

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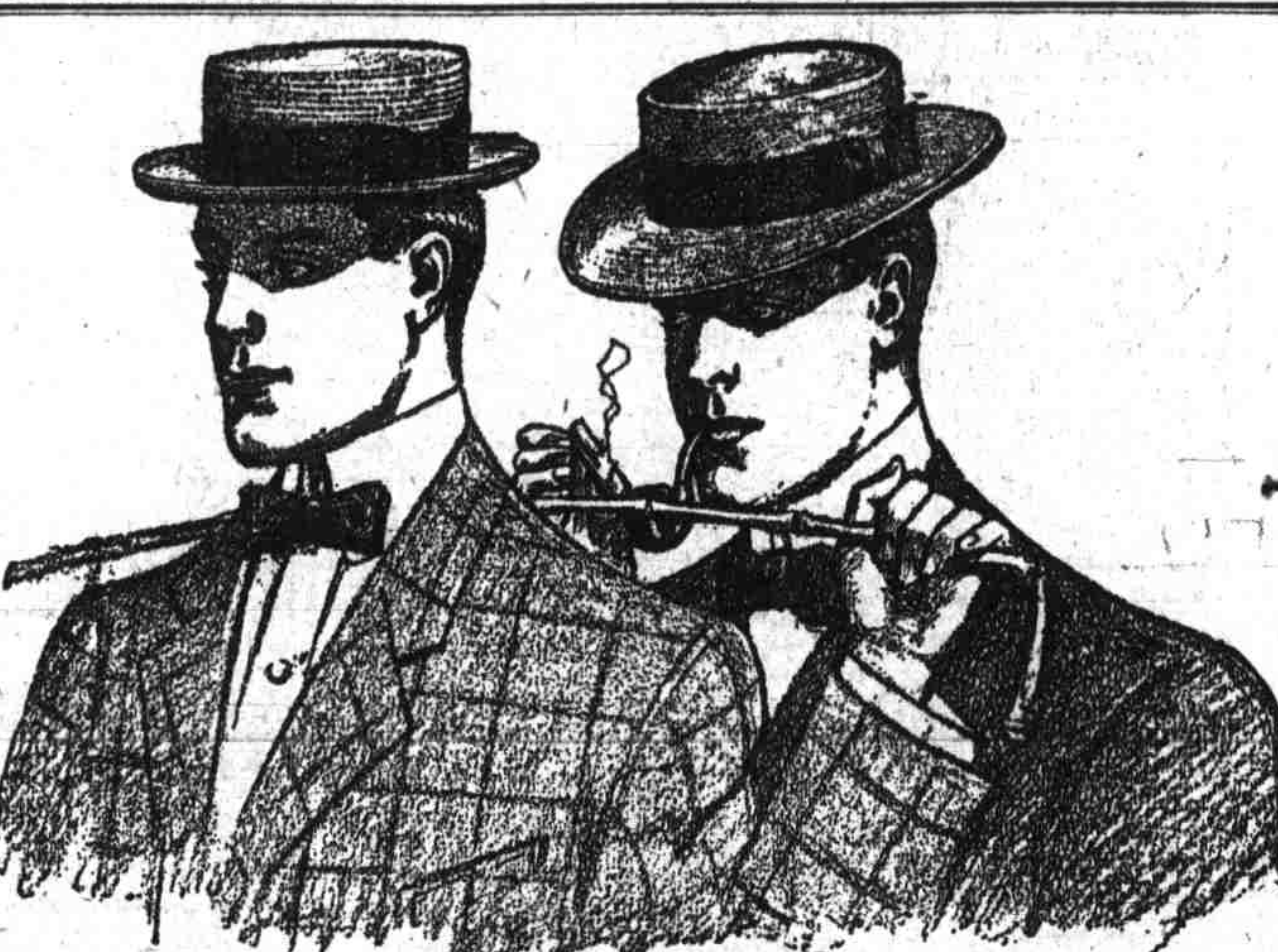
