SUPREME COURT REMANDS MARIE CARRAU APPEAL

Lower Court to Settle Facts on Which Motion to Dismiss Is Based.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Olympia, Wash., May 27.—The famous Marie Carrau nuncupative will in the John Sullivan estate case from the state supreme court has been remanded to the lower court in the form of a motion to dismiss the appeal. After

having been admitted to probate in the state supreme court the proceedings were set aside by the supreme court and an unfavorable decision in the superior court later all but put an end to the lead-pencil memorandum by which Sullivan was declared to have willed his million-dollar estate to the Carrau woman. The motion to dismiss the appeal was made on the ground that the transcript in the case had not been filed within the proper time. The supreme court has now remanded the proceedings to the superior court of King county with instructions to ascertain the facts as to when the transcript was filed.
