WATER PRESSURE BLOWS HOLE IN STEEL CONDUIT

Small Puncture in the Bull Run Is Cause for Calling Out of an Engine.
A puncture in the big steel conduit which conveys the city's water supply from Bull Run river called out one of the reserve engines Saturday to pump water out of an excavation so that workmen could repair the damage. At the water office this morning it was stated that there was an occasion for any alarm from possible fire, for it was impossible, owing to the construction of the pipe, for it to sustain any damage other than small punctures.
The main consists of rolled sheets of steel riveted together, making it impossible to sand or break as cast iron pipe is susceptible of doing. water officials state, and during the 14 1/2 years it has been in service there has never been any necessity of shutting off for repairs. Sixty-six million gallons of water are held under reserve in the four reservoirs in the city, which is believed sufficient to take care of ordinary fires.

Change of Terminus Russell-Shaver Line.

Commencing June 1, the Russell-Shaver cars will discontinue running up Fifth street to Washington, and will go up Burnside street to Sixteenth street, making the terminus at Sixteenth and Washington streets, instead of Second and Washington streets.
