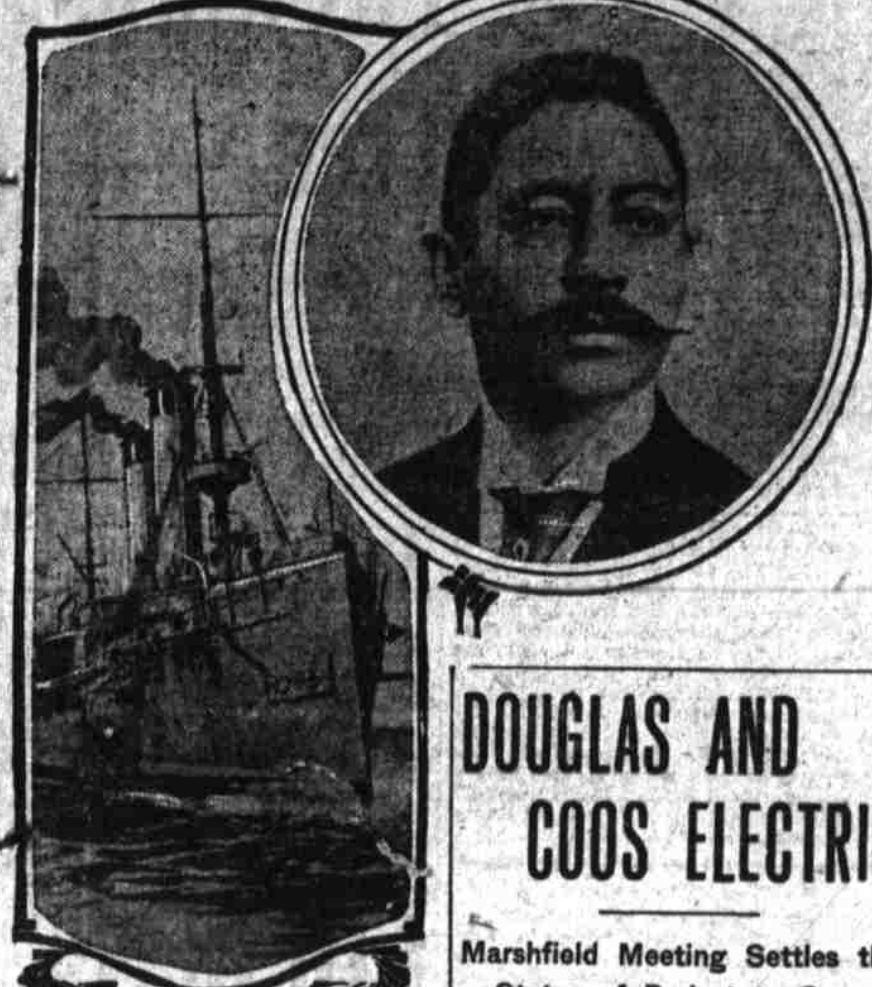


PRESIDENT MANUEL BONILLA AND CRUISER HE FLED UPON



BONILLA SLAIN FOR TREACHERY

Ex-President of Salvador Taken
From Steamer by Force of
Arms and Is Believed to Have
Been Executed.

(Journal Special Service.)
San Francisco, May 29.—The steamer
City of Sydney, arriving last night from
Central America, brings a story of the
probable death by execution of Juan
Fuentes and M. Bonilla, alleged traitors
of Salvador, who were taken into cus-
tody aboard the City of Sydney by Senor
Figueroa, son of General Figueroa,
president of Salvador. Passengers ar-
riving on the steamer believe that the
two prisoners were shot soon after they
were taken ashore.

Fuentes was formerly private secre-
tary to General Figueroa and was pos-
sessed of all the important secrets of
the administration. Of Bonilla not
much is known.

They succeeded in getting out of Sal-
vador safely after being aboard the
cruiser Chicago and then taking passage
on the Pacific Mail steamer Peru bound
for this city. At San Jose de Guaste-
mala, however, they left the steamer
and boarded the City of Sydney, bound
toward Panama, evidently expect-
ing to avoid personal pursuit.

When the Sydney reached Acapulco,
Salvador, young Figueroa went aboard
the steamer and demanded their cus-
tody. Captain McLean refused to give
them up and Figueroa remained on
board as a passenger. At La Libertad,
the next port south, he went ashore
returning soon afterward with a squad
of soldiers. Again he demanded the
custody of Fuentes and Bonilla, argu-
ing that they were citizens of Salvador
and wanted by the authorities and
this time Captain McLean gave them
up. They were taken ashore without
delay or much ceremony.

LAND COMMISSIONER IS COMING OUT WEST

KEYSTONE CON IN OREGON ORE

Pittsburg Capitalists Are Thor-
oughly Equipping the
Tin Pan Property.

MEANWHILE LOOKING
FOR ANYTHING GOOD

Gold Medal Mine Property to Be
Thoroughly Equipped This Sum-
mer—More Development on Rich
Golden Leaf Mine.

Grant's Pass, Or., May 29.—The prop-
erty of the Pacific American Gold
Mining company, which have been under
development for the past four or
five years, are now ready for operation.
Three carloads of equipment and ma-
chinery that arrived here last month
has been placed. The big mill and re-
duction plant will make its test run this
coming week. Coincident with the start-
ing up of the plant is the arrival of
Messrs. Mental, Kitchener and Siebert,
capitalists of Pittsburg, Pennsylvania,
who are heavily interested in the mines.
They will not only inspect their own
mines but will visit other properties and
camps of southern Oregon before return-
ing home.

The principal property of the Pacific
American Gold Mining company is the
Tin Pan mine, on Galls creek in the
Gold Hill district. The company has
concentrated its efforts on the opening
and chipping this property for exten-
sive work, and has been rewarded by
bringing to light one of the largest and
richest ore bodies in southern Oregon.
Several hundred feet of underground
work has been done, mainly by direct
tunnel and drift, by which the ore can
be easily and cheaply extracted. The
ledge has a width of six feet, is well
defined and carries milling values from
wall to wall with little or no waste
quartz. The company will operate the
new mill steadily with a day and night
shift.

Richness of the Gold Medal.
The Gold Medal mine on Palmer creek
which has been under development for
the past two years by J. R. Ray and A.
M. McKee, will be equipped this summer
with a stamp mill and reduction plant,
hoist, compressor, machine drills and all
machinery necessary for quartz mining.
Ray and McKee have decided to place
the Gold Medal in the producing class at
once, as the ore body gives every indica-
tion of being permanent and its
values absolutely dependable. The
showing of the mine during the past two
months has been nothing short of re-
markable. Its vein carries gold at a
rate that would make the owner of a
Nevada bonanza open his eyes in aston-
ishment. The ledge has an average
width of five feet and the property is so
situated as to allow of deep development
and ore removal by direct tunnel. At
the deepest point uncovered the ledge
carries values of from \$25 to \$100 a ton.
There is not only an abundance of tim-
ber on the Gold Medal claims, but also
water power in plenty to operate the
proposed mill and plant.

Golden Leaf to Be Developed.
The Starveout district mines in the
Canyon mountains of northern Josephine
and southern Douglas counties are being
actively worked. Several are producing,
the ore being hauled to the railroad for
shipment. One of the oldest and deepest
developed properties of this district
is the Golden Leaf. Assays made from
the upper levels show values of from
\$15 to \$20 a ton, free gold. These are
the values of the main bulk of the ledge;
besides there are smaller strings that
run up into the thousands. The ledge
of the Golden Leaf is from three to
four feet wide, and the formation dior-
ite and porphyry. The character of the
ore is very similar to that of the famous
old Greenback of the Grave Creek dis-
trict. The mines of the two districts,
in fact, are but a few miles apart and
located on the same mineral belt, being
separated only by a mountain divide. J.
C. Rickard and L. A. Curtis, owners and
managers of the Golden Leaf, are pre-
paring to develop the property this
summer.

CONFEDERATE VETERANS ASSEMBLE AT RICHMOND

Heroes of Lost Cause Attend
Unveiling of Monuments to
Davis and Stuart.

Richmond, Va., May 29.—The seven-
teenth reunion of the United Con-
federate Veterans will be opened in this
city tomorrow morning. The crowd of
visitors is expected to be the largest
ever entertained in Richmond. The un-
veiling of monuments to Jefferson Davis
and General Stuart are features of ad-
ded interest to the reunion program.
And the fact that the Jamestown ex-
position is within easy reach of Rich-
mond will result in a largely increased
attendance at the reunion.

Hundreds of gray-clad veterans
reached the city today, and the play-
ing of martial music is to be heard
throughout the business section. By
tomorrow morning the great mass of
visitors will have arrived, and it is
roughly estimated that fully 150,000
persons will be here by the time the
convention opens.

The veterans and other visitors have
found Richmond swathed in bunting, the
stars and bars of the Confederate pre-
dominating. Thousands of national
flags are also used and many tattered
battle flags are displayed from the
homes of the owners who carried them
through the war.

The exercises tomorrow will be opened
at 9:30 o'clock in the morning, when
the convention will be opened by or-
der by Major General Smith Bolling, com-
manding the Virginia division. Prelim-
inary business will occupy the initial
session. In the afternoon will come
the big parade and the unveiling of the
Stuart statue.

AMERICANS TO EXPLORE CONGO

Mineral Prospecting Party Sent
Out by Thomas F. Ryan
and Associates.

Antwerp, May 29.—The mineral pro-
specting expedition to the Congo sent
out by the International Forestry com-
pany, in which Thomas F. Ryan and
other New Yorkers are interested, will
depart from here tomorrow for Luebo,
in the Congo, by way of Boma. Pros-
pecting will commence immediately
upon the arrival of the party. The
expedition is headed by R. Dorsey Mo-
hun, a well-known explorer and former
American consular agent at Boma. S.
W. Ball is the geologist of the expedi-
tion.

The American company received from
King Leopold last November a grant for
rubber and other exploitation of about
2,500,000 acres for 99 years. The con-
cessions include not only exploitation
of the India rubber resources of the
country, but a franchise to construct
a railroad, and mining leases over a
territory rich in copper and half as
large as the territory of Alaska. There
is silver also and some gold, as well
as other valuable minerals, but the prin-
cipal reliance of the prospectors is upon
copper. It is accordingly to copper min-
ing that the company will first devote
its energies.

The concession to the Americans is
generally regarded as a clever move on
the part of King Leopold to involve the
United States in any future interna-
tional complication which may arise
owing to the conduct of affairs of the
Independent State. Those interested in
the company are men of great influence,
as well as of great wealth. Besides Mr.
Ryan, they include the Messrs. Gur-
genheim, Harry Payne Whitney and
John D. Rockefeller, Jr.

given his freedom on furnishing bail.

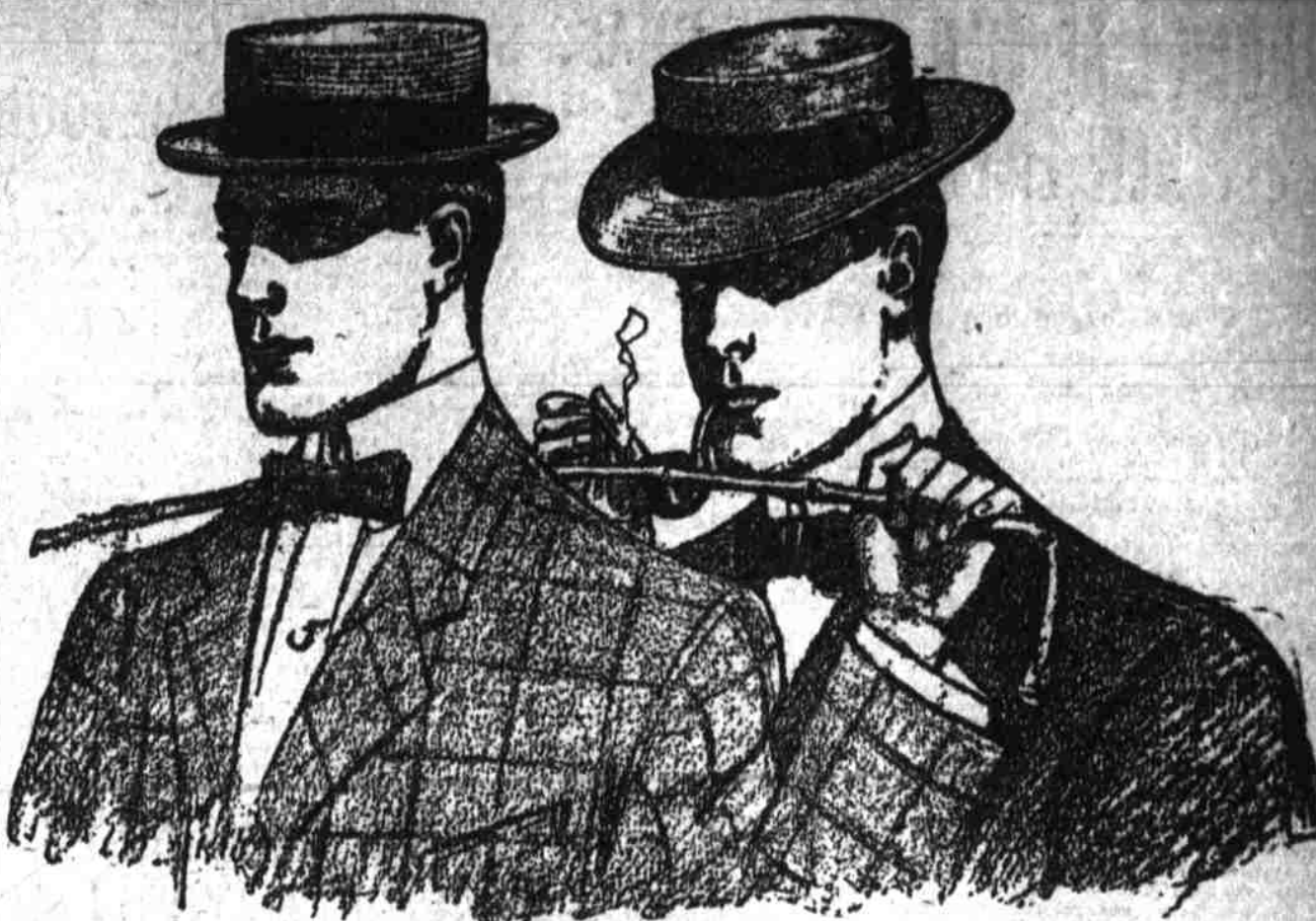
