

LONG SAYS ROOSEVELT IS RANK NATURE FAKER

Author Demands That Roosevelt Make Public Apology for the Placing of His Name on the Roll of the National Ananias Club.

Stamford, Conn., May 29.—Demanding a "square deal" in an apology for having been placed in the National Ananias Club, the Rev. Dr. W. J. Long has placed President Roosevelt "in a hole" which, apparently, he will be unable to crawl out of unless he recedes from his much-touted "fair play" policy and hides behind the cloak of his official dignity. Dr. Long has arraigned the president as a nature faker and demanded that the chief executive apologize for the wrong he has done him, declaring that the issue between them is that of men, not longer of animals.

In an open letter to the president Dr. Long cites authorities to prove that his story about a big white wolf killing a young caribou by biting it in the breast is not only possible, but similar instances have occurred several times. He also asserts that if the proof presented is not sufficient he will bring any number of witnesses in his own behalf that will be necessary to convince the president that he is right.

One Must Apologize.
Dr. Long declares himself ready and willing to make public apology to the president if any of his stories or statements can be proved untrue, but also insists that when they are proven to be facts the president must likewise show his willingness to be fair and make public amends to the author. He says:

"You cannot at this stage, Mr. Roosevelt, take refuge behind the presidential office and maintain silence. You have forfeited your right to silence by breaking it; by coming out in publication and attacking a private citizen. If your talk of a square deal is not all sham, if your frequent moral preaching is not hypocritical, I call upon you as president, as a man, to come out and admit the error and injustice of your charge in the same open and public way in which you made it."

Great stress is laid upon the fact that the president's arraignment of Dr. Long had the effect of discrediting a writer and ruining the sale of his books. The author also holds up the fact that the president took unfair advantage of him in the controversy by using his enormous power as chief executive to discredit the writer as a private citizen.

President Is Merciless.
President Roosevelt's arraignment of Dr. Long was made in an interview given E. B. Clark for Everybody's Magazine.

In this story the president is quoted as saying that Long is perhaps the worst "nature faker" in the country, and the president expresses the belief that great injury is done the children of the public schools by placing his works in their hands with the stamp of truth upon them.

In a recent interview Dr. Long intimated that President Roosevelt is angry because the author dared to criticize him for "laughing game promiscuously." Dr. Long said:

"Ordinarily I would ignore such an attack. If you read the article, even carefully, you will see it is personal and venomous in spirit, while its literary style marks it fit for the waste basket. There is not a magazine in the country which would print it on its own merits. Were it not for Mr. Roosevelt's official position no attention would be paid to the article, but his position gives weight and importance to his work, so I am obliged to take notice of it."

Roosevelt a Faker.
"The title of this article is 'Roosevelt on the Nature Fakers.' The first thing I notice about the article is that it is itself a fake. Mr. Roosevelt has frequently declared, in the midst of his endless personal squabbles, that the president must not enter into a personal controversy. In the present case, this alleged interview is one of the transparent modesties behind which he conceals his colossal vanity."

Mr. Roosevelt arranged this interview, and, as I am informed by the magazine, revised the proofs, from the gross personal flattery at the beginning to the unfounded charge at the end, in concealing himself behind an alleged interview, and using his position to attack a man of whose spirit he knows nothing, his article seems to me not only venomous, but a little cowardly—just as when he hides behind a tree and kills three bull elk in succession, leaving their carcasses to rot in the woods. That in itself is incomprehensible to sportsmen, but what jars you altogether is the preaching which follows, on the heroism and high moral qualities developed by hunting."

"The next thing manifest in the article, even to the most casual reader, is the personal animosity. Though he mentions other writers, he devotes three quarters of his attack to me, and as I am the only one whose books are used in the public schools—which, by the way, he considers an outrage—the whole weight of his attack falls upon one man."

THIEVES' KING SLAIN BY ENEMY

W. H. Wheeler Kills Daniel McCarthy at San Francisco as Result of Old Feud.

San Francisco, May 29.—Scarcely two hours after he had stabbed Daniel McCarthy, a longshoreman, last night, H. W. Wheeler, a teamster, met him on the way from the hospital and fired a bullet into his heart. Wheeler had threatened to kill McCarthy, and he kept his word.

There was an old feud between the two men, and when they met last night at a saloon near Ninth and Brannan streets, a quarrel ensued. Wheeler drew a knife and with a savage thrust inflicted a deep wound in McCarthy's shoulder. Bystanders separated the pair, and McCarthy was taken to the City and County hospital, where his wounds were dressed.

McCarthy left immediately after the cut was treated, and proceeded toward his home. As he passed a vacant lot, Wheeler stepped from behind a fence and, pointing his pistol at him, fired point blank. The bullet entered McCarthy's heart, killing him instantly. McCarthy's body was taken to the morgue. He has no family. To the Mission police the dead man was known as "The King of Forty Thieves."

SEARCHING FOR ARTIST'S GOLD

Mayor Busse Will Trace Lost Relief Fund Sent From Paris After Chicago Fire.

Chicago, Ill., May 29.—Mystery of missing treasure, varying from \$10,000 to \$40,000, was unfolded to Mayor Busse by Henri Merou, the French consul to Chicago, today. The treasure has been lost 36 years, and the French official now wants the mayor to locate it for him.

It originally was a fund sent by artists of the Latin quarter of Paris for succor of fellow students in Chicago, who were victims of the fire of 1871. Its final destination has been forgotten and Consul Merou hints that it never reached those it was designed to aid.

After the fire, a collection, not of funds, but of art works, was taken up in Paris and shipped to New York. There this collection was auctioned for the benefit of the Chicago artists and the fund was sent west.

Mayor Busse promised that he would have the records searched to settle definitely what became of the gift from Paris.

ONE HAD TO SLEEP IN FRONT OF BEDROOM DOOR

Three Husbands Appeal to the Court for Relief From Better Halves.

Three husbands have sought relief from their marriage vows in the divorce court. Two of them claim to have been deserted while the third alleges cruelty and asks that his wife be compelled to pay the costs of his divorce suit.

R. O. Evans charges that Mrs. S. C. Evans deserted him in March, 1906, and wants a divorce. He says also that he has acquired three acres of improved land near Elk City, in Lincoln county, and wants the court to decree that he is the sole owner of it. They were married at Stevenson, Washington, in April, 1900.

Herbert O. Swan charges that Nellie D. Swan deserted him twice. The first desertion occurred in September, 1904, two months after their marriage at Corvallis. In May, 1905, Mrs. Swan returned to her husband and they lived together until August of that year, when she departed again.

George Frederick Ritter alleges that Matilda Ritter married him last December for the sole purpose of getting his property. He says he deeded her some property on the east side, and that she has since treated him cruelly. On one occasion, says Ritter, his wife locked him out and he had to sleep on the floor in front of their bedroom door. He asks a divorce, wants the deed set aside, and judgment for \$200 for the cost of procuring the divorce.

PLANS READY FOR MEMORIAL DAY

Entire Day Tomorrow Will Be Spent in Honor of the Nation's Dead.

EXERCISES ON BOTH SIDES OF THE RIVER

Civil War and Spanish-American Veterans Will March Side by Side—Flowers Are to Be Strwn Over Many Graves.

Homer Sutcliffe, department commander of the G. A. R. of Oregon, will be grand marshal of the day during the Memorial day observances on Thursday. Arrangements for the program have been completed by the Memorial day committee.

At 8 o'clock Thursday morning comrades from Summer post, and those who wish to join them, will assemble at Summer post headquarters, Grand avenue and East Pine streets, and from there will march to Lone Fir cemetery to decorate the graves of veterans who lie buried there. Members of Ben outler post and of various relief corps will join in the exercises at the graves.

Morning Exercises.
G. A. R. veterans on the west side and the Women's Relief Corps at the same hour will go informally to west side cemeteries to decorate the graves on this side of the river. All who are interested are invited to join. The exercises of the day will be held at 10:30 o'clock in the forenoon near the soldiers' monument in Lone Fir cemetery, and at 2 o'clock in the afternoon in the plaza block on Fourth street. The morning program follows:

Dirge, band; prayer, Department Chaplain H. A. Barden; G. A. R. service and short address by Mrs. D. C. Miller, W. R. C.; Veterans quartet; address, 'Abraham Lincoln,' Hon. George H. Williams; selection, orchestra; 'Lincoln's Address at Gettysburg,' M. L. Pratt; 'Marching Through Georgia,' orchestra; address, 'In Memory of the Dead,' Father E. T. Sherman; selection, orchestra; salute to the dead; 'America,' Veterans quartet and audience; benediction, department chaplain; taps, bugler, O. N. G.

Comrades from George Wright, Lincoln, Garfield and other G. A. R. posts with other veterans wishing to participate will assemble at the Mulkey building, Second and Morrison streets, for parade. Other organizations wishing to take part will assemble in that vicinity under Homer Sutcliffe, commander and grand marshal, and T. B. McDevitt, officer of the day. The Third regiment, O. N. G., and Spanish war veterans will march as escort.

Parade in Afternoon.
The parade in connection with the Memorial day exercises will start from Second and Morrison streets promptly at 2:30 o'clock. The order of the parade will be as follows: First division—Third regiment, Oregon National Guard, Colonel C. E. McDonnell commanding; Spanish War Veterans. The Oregon National Guard will form on Second street, right resting on Morrison, while the Spanish War Veterans will form on Second street, right resting on Taylor.

Second division—Brown's band; department color-bearer, E. C. Edmunds; Grand Marshal H. Sutcliffe; department staff and aids; George Wright Post, No. 1, A. E. Borthwick, aid; Lincoln-Garfield Post, No. 2, Dr. J. E. Hall, aid; Summer Post, No. 12, J. A. Barden, aid; Benjamin F. Butler Post, No. 57, J. R. Chamberlain, aid; invited guests and veterans in carriages. The Grand Army posts will form on Morrison street, right resting on Second. Allows Spouse to Remain at Home After Giving Position to Another Woman.

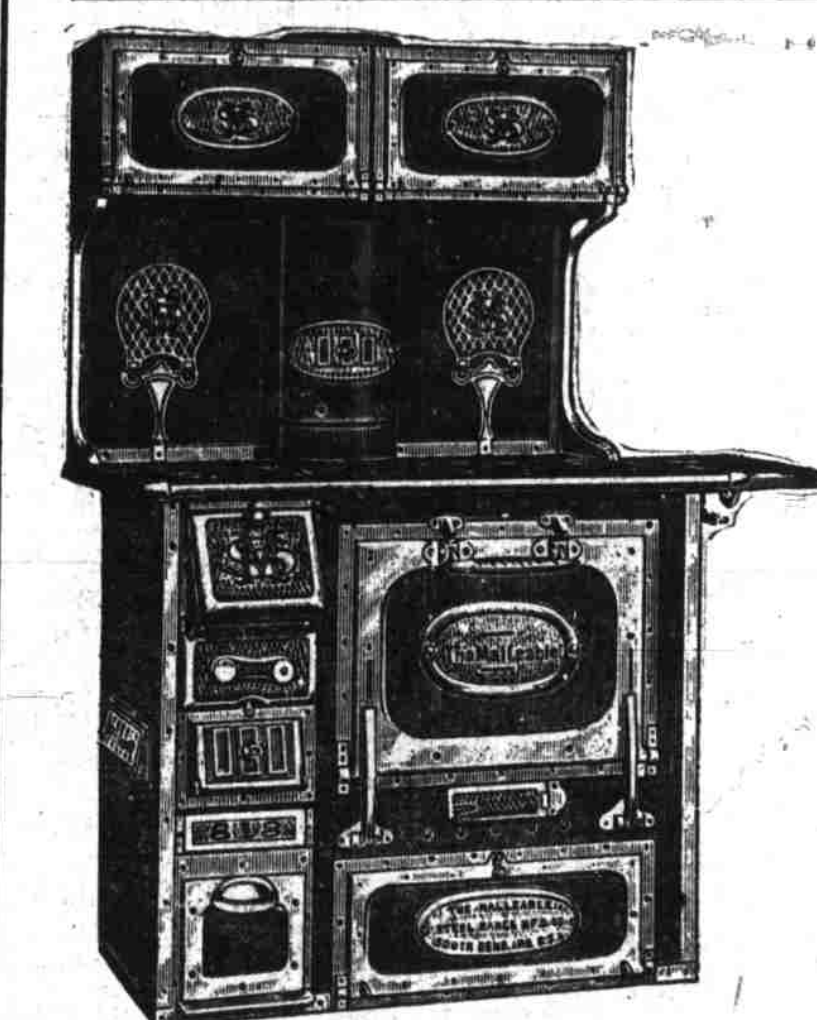
