INCREASED SERVICE GIVES EMPLOYMENT

Payrolls of Portland Railways, Light & Power Company Grow With Extensions.

Several hundred employes will have been added to the pay rolls of the Portland Railway, Light & Power company by tomorrow evening because of new and additional service. New service includes the Oaks system, considerably augmented yesterday when the Oaks was opened; the all-east service to be started tomorrow and the operation of the Troutdale extension of the Springwater division. Besides more cars will be put on the lines in the city to take care of summer traffic. These latter are principally new open cars. The traction company has ordered 1,350 tons of grooved rails for repair work. The shipment is expected during the summer some time.

LAWYER MOSER TAKES EXCEPTION TO ARTICLE

Meeting Tuesday Evening for All Labor Men, Not Cigar Men, Says Attorney.

Gus C. Moser takes exception to an article in The Journal describing a secret meeting held Tuesday night in Alley hall. It was current report that the meeting was called for the purpose of having the cigar men of the city and various union men meet with Mr. Devlin for the purpose of discussing conditions which may arise should Mr. Devlin be elected mayor. It is believed firmly by the cigar men of the city that the slot machines will be allowed back on the counters in the event of Mr. Devlin's election, and some of them stated beforehand that the meeting was called to discuss this question.

The meeting was a very quiet one and secret, reporters being asked to leave. The letter of Mr. Moser follows: Portland, May 28.—To the Editor of The Journal.—In your issue of Wednesday you published on the first page, under glaring headlines, an article concerning a meeting of labor people held at Alley hall on Tuesday evening that is so misleading that I cannot permit it to pass unchallenged, and I therefore ask that in all fairness you publish my letter as conspicuously as you did the original article.

The article is misleading, because it seeks to give out the impression that a secret meeting was held with the cigarmakers and cigar store employes for the purpose of giving assistance to them in the event of Mr. Devlin's election poker games and slot machines will be allowed to resume operations. This is untrue, because no such assurance was given.

The meeting was not a meeting of cigar men. It was a meeting of labor men of many different lines, and it was not a meeting of 25 men, but of at least 75 men.

I am reliably informed that there have been held similar meetings of labor men which were addressed by supporters of Mayor Lane, and I do not see why the Democratic nominee should have a monopoly on such meetings. The article is also emphatically incorrect in saying that I was one of the promoters of the meeting. I had absolutely nothing to do with the promotion thereof. I was invited to be present as a speaker, to discuss the issues involved in this campaign, and I did so from the standpoint of a Republican who believes that Mr. Devlin is better qualified than Dr. Lane to properly perform the duties of mayor of this beautiful, prosperous and rapidly growing city, and that he will give us a good, clean and honest administration. He has said repeatedly on the platform during this campaign that, if elected, he will suppress gambling in every form, and he made no different promise at the meeting referred to.

ESTABLISH QUARANTINE IN DIPHTHERIA CASES

of those absent furnished by him. I began an investigation which lasted one entire morning. I found two or three children suffering from diphtheria and detected one case in the school room. These I promptly put under quarantine and ordered the green flag to be displayed. This ought to be sufficient warning and if it is not I shall feel obliged to station policemen at the quarantined places to see that orders are enforced.
