



WEATHER REPORT.

The low pressure area yesterday over western Washington is now central over Alberta. It has caused cloudy weather with light showers generally throughout this district except in southern Oregon, where fair weather continues. Light rain has also fallen at scattered places in Utah, Nevada, Colorado, western Nebnaka, western Kansas, and Oklahoma. The disturbance yesterday over the lake region has increased in chergy and moved to Ontario. It has caused light but general rains in the lake region, middle Atlantic, and New England states.
