DOG CAUSES TROUBLE

Knocks Man into River in Trying to Walk Log.

A bewildered dog caused a great commotion down at the foot of Stark street yesterday afternoon, and at the same time gave Captain Amos of the launch Eya an opportunity to prove himself a true blue hero. The dog tried to walk on a log in doing so knocked Frank O'Brien, a boat builder, into the river. O'Brien and the dog were struggling in the water when Captain Amos spotted them from the port window of his cabin and without a moment's hesitation leaped into the river and saved O'Brien. The dog knew how to swim and was making for ashore at a rapid rate when last seen.

The boat builder was working on a float when without warning the dog made a rush for the log upon which he was standing. Not being equipped with caulk in his feet the dog slipped into the river. The slip sent the log on its beam ends and it was then that O'Brien lost his level-headedness for he went overboard with a scream for help. Then Captain Amos appeared and plunged into the swirling river. He grabbed O'Brien by the nape of the neck and held him upright and above water until Engineer Crocker, of the Eya, threw him a live buoy attached to a rope.

AMONG THE SHIPWRECKS

British Steamer Kilburn Piles Up on Arabian Coast.

The British steamer Kilburn which sailed hence about a year ago with a cargo of lumber for Europe went ashore on the coast of Arabia a few days ago and Captain Le Templeur and his crew had a narrow escape from being murdered by savage Bedouins when they tried to reach shore in the lifeboats. The natives tried to murder the shipwrecked tars and they had to seek safety on the open sea. The boats were eventually picked up by a Perim salvage tug.

The Kilburn was on her way from Wales to Japan with a general cargo when she encountered a stormy weather shortly after having passed out of the Buss canal. She pounded on a sandy and coral beach and tore several holes in her bottom. Captain Le Templeur in his last message to his owners seemed to think however that the vessel could be saved if given immediate attention.

The Kilburn is one of several vessels well known here to have met disaster within the past few days. Among the sailing vessels lost is the British bark Norma. The French bark Marthe Roux, bound for this port from Hamburg, will have to discharge about 1600 tons of her cargo before proceeding because of having run aground in leaving port with the result that the hull was badly strained. The vessel can be repaired without removing all of the cargo.

TO BE REPAIRED HERE

Steam Schooner Daisy Freeman Will Enter Drydock.

(Special Dispatch to the Journal.) Astoria, Or., June 7.—The water-logged steam schooner Daisy Freeman was shifted from the railroad wharf this morning to the O. R. & N. dock where she will be repaired after which she will be taken to Portland and placed on the dry dock for repair.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT

Captain Patterson has been communicated with concerning the depth of the channel here, and since there is ample water to accommodate any of the fleet, it is supposed that the Charleston and the fleet will be ordered here.
