This Is Memorial Sabbath Throughout Country for Woodmen of World and Women of Woodcraft—Fitting Observance of Day

Today is memorial Sunday throughout the country for members of the Woodmen of the World and Women of Woodcraft. Graves of departed neighbors will be decorated with flowers and impressive ritual services read at the unveiling of monuments erected during the year. Andrew Kan, Chinese merchant, whose auction house license was revoked by the city council for alleged illegal use, has refused to accept the refund of \$75 due him for the unexpired portion. The matter has been placed in the hands of City Attorney McNary, and criminal proceedings will be commenced against Kan for conducting an auction house without license.

Should the city attempt to invoke the aid of the police it is stated that Kan's attorney, G. C. Moser, will apply for a restraining order. The matter will then be taken into court in a friendly suit to determine the exact status of the matter.

Kan believes the city had no right to deprive him of his license. The Chinese merchant was conducting an auction house on the smaller license fee of \$40 per quarter, and the city contends that the class of auction houses to which Kan should be assigned would come under the higher license fee of \$70 per day.

No Way for Mrs. Nevin to Get From Honolulu to Midway.

Lieutenant Nevin and bride, who were married in Boston three weeks ago, and who arrived here by the transport Sher-

man, are up against a problem which is causing them no little uneasiness. Nevin applied for the Midway station some time ago and his request was granted. The next transport will carry him and 21 marines to the desolate sand speck mapped as Midway.

The question now arises how is Mrs. Nevin to get to the island to which her husband has been ordered?

The secretary of the navy has re-

voked a previously granted permission for the officer's wife to accompany her husband on a transport and the law prohibits women from traveling on naval vessels. The regular license only will allow her to be a ship's nurse.

If Mrs. Nevin succeeds in reaching Midway she will be the woman of the island, as there is no other woman there.
