

COALWITZ COAL TEST

Result of Experiment Will Settle Bet Besides Determining Success of Floating the Stock of the Company to Develop Mine.

The quality of the coal in the beds underlying Coville county, Washington, is to be tested on June 18 and 19 in the locomotives belonging to E. S. Collins, the well-known logger of Ostrander, Washington. Upon the outcome of the test depends the success of floating the stock of a company which has been organized to develop one of the largest exposed veins of coal in the vicinity of Portland.

The outcome of the experiment will determine whether \$1,000 will go as a donation to St. Vincent's hospital or be invested in an automobile. Checks for that amount have been handed to the journal, and will be awarded according to the report of judges who shall watch the test.

Compared with Green Slabwood. The wager is the outcome of a controversy between E. S. Collins of Ostrander, who contends that the lignite in question will not produce as much heat as will green fir slabwood, and J. C. Lee of Portland, who bets that the coal is superior to the slabwood. The conditions of the wager and the rules of the contest are expressed in the note of challenge and acceptance, which is as follows:

Ostrander, June 8, 1907.—Mr. E. S. Collins, Ostrander, Washington: I wager \$500 that coal from the middle canyon or anywhere in the property of the Consumers' Coal property, successors in property ownership to the Anchor Coal company, that four tons of coal from said property, anywhere in said property selected, will burn in the engines of E. S. Collins better than green fir slabwood, the engine to be selected by J. C. Lee. Collins will be notified 10 days in advance when the said test or wager coal will be taken out. The representative of the engine to be used shall be permitted to go freely upon the property of said Consumers' Coal company to watch the process of mining and to follow the coal to the engine. It is agreed that all coal shall be delivered within six days from the time test mining is begun. It is agreed that the Consumers' Coal company shall be given due notice and be allowed to inspect the green slabwood from the time it leaves the saw in the mill. If it is burned, the notice being given 10 days or so to the test. The judges shall be selected as follows: Either the hearing is to select one judge, the two judges to select a third judge. Test to begin June 18, and June 19.

(Signed) J. C. LEE. For Consumers' Coal company. Accepted: E. S. COLLINS. The controversy which is bound to attract considerable attention because of the importance of the issue and of the prominence of the parties involved.

TEACHERS UNION TO ORDER STRIKE

Chicago, June 10.—Backed by the Chicago Federation of Labor, the Teachers' Federation is preparing to fight any attempt which may be made by the new school board to break up its union and threatens to declare a strike and boycott against the schools. At one of the principal items in their plans of aggression the teachers are preparing to see that every member of the labor union of Chicago will take his children out of the public schools at the first intimation from the school board that it will carry into effect the declaration of President Otto C. Schneider that teachers must abandon their union.

President Schneider refused to discuss the threatened conflict. "I do not want to commit myself at this time as to any steps which may be taken against the teachers' union," he said. "There will be time enough to talk later." The Federation of Labor proposes to treat the question of union teachers as they would treat any question in which union members are involved in a lock-out.

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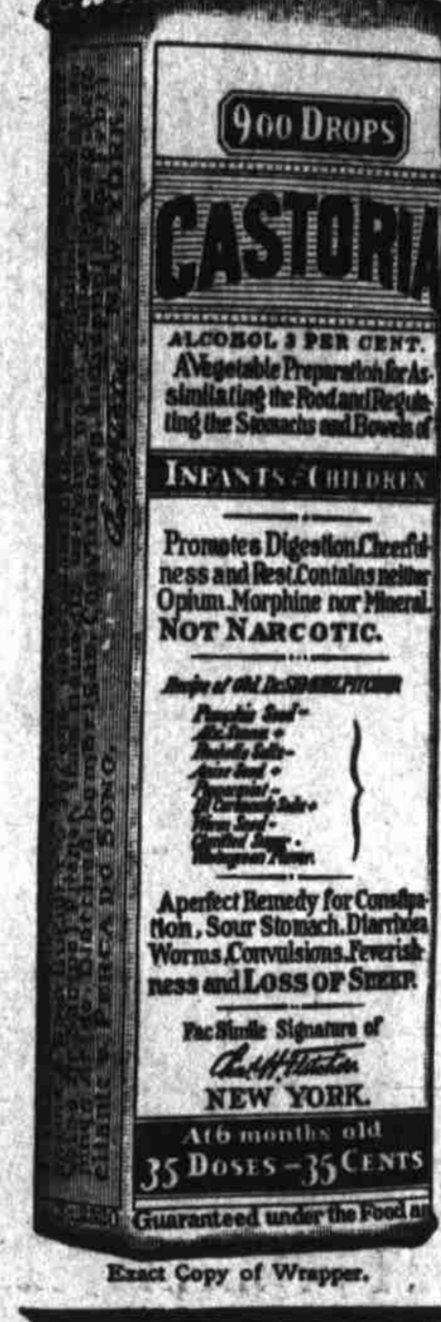
