The sum total of these two trust grafts, exclusive of the profit on plumbing work, reaches close to \$85,000 in the five months of this year. This sum was filched, without the grace of dark-ness to cover up the work, from the pockets principally of the wage-earner and homebuilder. These vast sums are divided equally among the firms who have contributed to the graft, at the monthly secret meetings of the com-bine's votaries.

All Works Are Guarded.

The road to the secret chambers of the trust, where each member of the combine shares monthly in the "divvy," leads through the outer and inner circles of the machine which spells profit for each of its manipulators.

A plumber who has successfully passed the examination required before the heart of avaminars and given the the board of examiners, and given the right to engage in business, joins the Master Plumbers' association, if he in-tends to remain in business. Otherwise he will be forced out.

One of the agreements made when a plumber steps from the outer circle of the Master Plumbers' association into the secret lodge of the Plumbers' Protective sanociation, is that he will charge \$5 "bonus" on every fixture he places. A band of Umatilla Indians, attired n gorgeous finery, will be a spectacular feature of the parade of the great ros show and flests. The red men in large numbers will participate in the parade according to arrangements just completed, and will form one of the most novel and interesting features.

Last year and until a short time ago the "bonus" tribute demanded by the protective association amounted to \$7 on every fixture placed by a plumbing firm. This was reduced to \$2 at the time of the threatened exposure by a plumber who had been denied admission again after being out of busines for a time into the inner circule of the combine.


