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RED CROSS IN SESSION TODAY

Delegates Representing 43
Nations Discuss Ways of
Humanizing War.

(Journal Special Service.)
London, June 10.—Delegates representing 43 nations assembled in London today for the eighth international Red Cross conference. Lord Rothschild, president of the British central committee, delivered an address of welcome, stating that the large and representative attendance afforded fresh evidence of the interest of the signatory governments in humanitarian work.

The delegates from the United States at the conference are Surgeon-General O'Reilly of the army, Medical Director Wise of the navy, Colonel Sanger, ex-assistant secretary of war; Miss Mabel Boardman of Washington, and Ernest F. Bicknell of Chicago. Canada is represented by Colonel J. M. Gibson and Colonel G. Sterling Ryerson.

Among the subjects to which the conference will devote attention are the following: Prevention of the abuse of the Red Cross flag and insignia; experience in international aid in times of war; what aid neutrals can render and what not; utilization of ordinary materials for the relief of the wounded; means of transportation, etc.; the place and role of women in time of war; organization and functions of bureaus of prisoners of war.

In connection with the conference there is being held in Earl's Court an exhibition of humanitarian inventions for the transportation of the wounded. Among the exhibits that attracted attention at the opening was the model of a carrier for the removal of disabled soldiers from a battlefield, the invention of Mrs. Chadwick, wife of Admiral Chadwick of the United States navy. NEW RAILWAY RULES ARE IN EFFECT TODAY

Olympia, Wash., June 10.—The new rules and regulations drawn up by the state railroad commission to govern the transportation of passengers, record of car distribution, the provision of safety devices and other matters were put into effect today. The rules provide, among other things, for the issuance of interchangeable tickets at regular rates good for 30 days, and for the redemption of some within six months if not used, provides for bulletin boards for recording train movements, specifies what the record of car distribution must show, and orders the maintenance of comfortable and sanitary waiting rooms and accessories.

RUB SALT ON GAPING WOUNDS

Horrible Torture Is Inflicted Upon Russian Political Prisoners by Jailers.

St. Petersburg, June 10.—Reports of the unspeakable horrors of the Russian prisons continue to be made to the duma. The latest reports to attract attention are those which M. Pergament is making in place of describing various outrages inflicted by the police and the prison administrations at Riga and other Baltic towns.

The sections of the reports already received constitute a horrible catalogue of tortures inflicted on political prisoners and suspects with the object of extracting confessions. One report begins by stating that a special committee was appointed at Riga for the purpose of directing the infliction of tortures and that the government, with the knowledge of the administrative authorities, the public prosecutor and the colonel of the local gendarmes, empowered the committee to kill accused persons without trial. Many of these things the governor admits of his own accord but pleads justification.

Unprintable Stories.
Some of the descriptions of the tortures employed are unprintable. The report alleges that finger and toe nails and hair were torn out, and that prisoners were flayed with india rubber sticks until the flesh was hanging in strips. Salt was then rubbed in.

One young man who was shot after having been tortured had one leg almost cut off and his body covered with other wounds. Another man was tied to a bench, a plank was laid across his body and two policemen sawed on it until they broke the back of the victim.

The police jumped on the body of a third man until his chest bones were crushed and his internal organs were in such a state that he could not swallow food—only water—until he died.

After being tortured, the maimed wretches were generally shot near the Riga Central prison.

Old and young were treated alike. A child of 8, for instance, was brutally flogged to make him tell where his father was.

An interpellation will be addressed to the government asking if nothing can be done to stop things like those already reported.

PHONES WILL LINK EAST OREGON MINES

La Grande, Or., June 10.—The mining districts of Union and Baker counties will soon be in direct communication by telephone. The completion of the forest reserve telephone system means that the line will commence at Starkley thence to the Aurelia mines and from there to North Powder. Another branch will leave the Aurelia mines for the Cable Cove section and the Bourne and Sumpter regions. This system will put all the mines of Union and many of the Baker county mines in closer communication.
