

RETIRED FOR BEACH

Hundreds of Citizens Desire Present Chairman of the School Board to Be Candidate for Re-election Next Monday.

A petition containing the names of about 400 prominent men of all classes in the city was this morning filed with School Clerk Allen asking that J. V. Beach, present chairman of the school board, be a candidate for re-election.

Those Who Are Eligible. The following extract from the Oregon school law shows who are eligible to vote at Monday's election: "Any citizen of this state, male or female, who is 21 years of age and has resided in the district 30 days immediately preceding the meeting or election, and has property in the district, as shown by the last county assessment, and not assessed by the sheriff, on which he or she is liable or subject to pay a tax, shall be entitled to vote at any school meeting or election in said district. Provided, that, for the purposes of this section, any man who is a citizen of the United States, and has resided in the state for six months immediately preceding the meeting or election, and has property in the district, shall be considered a citizen of this state. Provided, further, that any person shall be deemed to have complied with the property qualification imposed by this section who presents to the directors or judges of election satisfactory evidence as shown by the last county assessment, and not assessed by the sheriff, on which such corporation, firm or copartnership pays a tax, although his or her own name does not appear upon the tax roll."

FARMERS' INSTITUTE HEARS GOOD TALKS

Professor Beattie Discusses the Fighting of the Plant Diseases.

Chehalis, Wash., June 12.—At a very interesting session of the Lewis County Farmers' institute held in Chehalis Professor Beattie talked of "Fighting Plant Diseases." He laid down two propositions. First, that the farmer cannot afford to raise crops and feed them to parasitic plants or insects. Second, that many diseased plants are the result of other plants stealing food from them. These parasitic plants should be killed by this purpose. Copper in the form of blue vitriol is the best general poison for this purpose. It should be prepared in the form of Bordeaux mixture, or neutralized with milk of lime that it may be used safely on trees. This poison must be placed at the proper time, which differs in the case of each disease. It is the purpose of the agricultural department to provide information of all kinds along these lines and the State college is endeavoring in every way to serve this useful purpose.

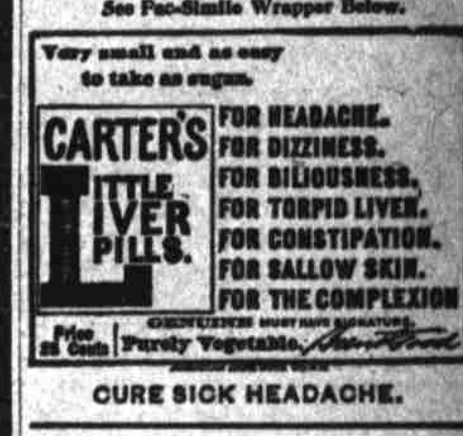
