Examinations are announced by the United States Civil Service commission for July 10 and 11 for telegraph operator, micro-analyzer, laboratory inspector, topographic draftsman, and copyist topographic draftsman. Two days, July 10 and 11, will be given over to examinations in the two last named fields, the others requiring but one day, July 10. Applications will be open to competitors from all of the states and territories under the American flag. In Oregon examinations will be held at Portland, Astoria, Baker City and Eugene.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power company has commenced work on the long expected Alder street loop for the use of the O. W. P. cars. Workmen have commenced the construction of a line on Alder street between First and Second streets and when it is completed the O. W. P. cars will run from the Madison street bridge to Second street, down Second to Alder and there loop back to the depot at First and Alder. This will do away with the present cumbersome switchback on First street.

Contract for printing 700 copies of the proposed new charter of the city of St. Johns was awarded by the council last night to the Kelso Printing company, Kelso, Washington. The bid of the Kelso company was \$206, being the lowest submitted. The St. Johns ferry

NATIONAL GUARD IN DEFENSE MANEUVERS

Members of Oregon's National Guard will participate in the coast-defense maneuvers at the mouth of the Columbia river this year, and Adjutant-General William E. Finzer will issue an order shortly directing the troops to leave Portland for Seaside July 8. This order will include all troops save seven companies that will be assigned to the

maneuvers at Fort Stevens and Columbia under government appropriation. The soldiers are expecting a great time at their encampment this year. A plan will probably be arranged under which the troops will march to the coast in a mimic campaign. Their march to the mouth of the Columbia will be either in the nature of an attack or as a support to the posts in warding off a theoretical landing force.
