WEATHER REPORT

The western high pressure area is now central off the Oregon coast, and the rains on the Pacific slope have practically ceased. A local shower, however, occurred at Boise last night and one inch and four hundredths of rain fell at that station. A heavy frost occurred early this morning at Pocatello and a light frest at Spokane. The barometer is relatively low along the entire eastern slope of the Rocky mountains and a high pressure area overlies the lake region and the lower Mississippi valley. The temperatures at the headwaters of the Snake and Columbia rivers are from eight to thirteen degrees below normal.
