

FIRE LADDIES DID GOOD WORK

Igniting Gasoline Threat-
ened Destruction of Auto
Repair Shop.

It was on the prompt work of the fire department and the presence of mind displayed by two chauffeurs that saved the valuable automobiles and the repair shop of the Pullman Auto Car company at Sixth and Alder streets, from complete destruction yesterday afternoon.

M. E. Norcross, a chauffeur for W. H. Moore, was at work with a blow pipe on one of the big cars in the establishment when the flame from the contrivance ignited a quantity of gasoline. There were three 50-gallon and one 6-gallon can of gasoline in the place and the flames spread with incredible speed to these drums.

Arthur Uhlfers, a truckman, was showered with blazing gasoline from an exploding can, but was not burned owing to his prompt action in rolling on the floor and in this manner extinguishing the burning garments. The firemen with a great display of daring rolled the large tanks of gasoline into the rear yard and thereby prevented a bad fire.

Inasmuch as the city ordinance provides that not more than 100 gallons of gasoline shall be stored in any build-

ing within the fire limits an investigation will undoubtedly be made by the fire marshal and Chief Campbell.

The ignition of a gasoline tank in the rear of A. Stipe's confectionery store, 440 Washington street, about 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon brought out the fire department in response to a still alarm. Quick work on the part of the fire department saved the store and the Sherman rooming house above. The damage was about \$50, fully covered by insurance.

DRYNESS OF ST. LOUIS REACHES TOP LIMIT

Lid Is an Accomplished Fact in That
City and the Law Is Rigidity
Enforced.

St. Louis, Jan. 17.—The dryness of St. Louis reached the top limit yesterday when Excise Commissioner Melville's order closing saloons from Saturday midnight to 3 o'clock Monday morning, in compliance with the requirements of the new dramshop law, which went into effect.

The lid in St. Louis is an accomplished fact. There are cities in which great stress is laid on Sunday closing, but where the extent of the law enforced stops at closing front doors, and pulling down front window curtains, but in this city, the lid is on. Enforcement of the Sunday law has been vigorous and effective.

Wellston at city limit is wet. Thirst pailers are numerous. All car lines leading there did an enormous business. Across the river, in East St. Louis, the lid has disappeared entirely, the only restrictions being that saloon keepers are required to keep front doors closed on Sunday.

DAY AGAIN GRILLS ENEMIES OF TRUSTS

Educator Denounces Roosevelt and
Bryan—Declares Them
Anarchists.

Rochester, N. Y., June 17.—The University of Rochester seniors had full charge of the university and campus today, it being their annual class day. Part of the exercises were held in the gymnasium and the remainder were conducted in the open air. Hugh A. Smith was master of ceremonies, and Charles D. Heaton the class orator.

THIRTY-FOUR VICTIMS IN CHILIAN QUAKE

Valparaiso, June 17.—The latest Valdivia dispatches report that 34 people in all were killed or wounded by the recent earthquake. The Catholic church was one of the buildings which suffered most. Telegraph, telephone and railroad lines are badly damaged and all trains are stopped, owing to the destruction of several bridges. The region affected by the shock extends from Valparaiso to Magellan straits and from the Pacific coast to Neuquén in Argentina.

FORAKER QUESTIONS VERACITY OF TEXANS

Washington, June 17.—Senator Foraker, who conducted the examination of witnesses on behalf of the negro soldiers of the Twenty-fifth infantry before the investigation of the Brownsville affair, today questioned the accuracy of the testimony of the townspeople relative to the identity of the rioters and said:
