

ROSES READY TO OPPOSE HARRIMAN

Great Display in Forestry Building Nearing Completion—Judges of Fiesta Exhibits and Decorations Announced This Morning.

The huge Forestry building on the old Lewis and Clark fair grounds will be open to the public Thursday morning at 10 o'clock. Final exhibits are now being installed and by tomorrow evening decorations will be completed.

At the Forestry building the Rose society will hold its display of roses during the rose carnival and fiesta. The building is being converted into a veritable bower of floral beauty and the display will be one of the exquisite features of the fiesta.

Judges of the exhibit were announced this morning at carnival headquarters. The judges will be L. G. Pfunder and Mrs. F. L. Fuller of Portland and Mrs. Elizabeth Lord of The Dalles. Upon them will fall the responsibility of selecting the prize winners from among the myriad of displays at the Forestry building.

Judges who will award prizes for the best decorations were also announced at headquarters this morning. They are Mrs. F. Egert, W. T. Gardner and George W. Hill.

In selecting his aids for the great parade on Friday Grand Marshal C. E. McDowell used the field and staff of the third infantry, Oregon National Guard, and today announced the following:

The management of the carnival is urging contributions of flowers and other flowers for decoration purposes. They claim that the success of the fiesta depends upon the manner in which the public responds to requests for floral contributions. Such contributions should be left at the armory or the Multnomah club Thursday afternoon or Friday morning.

Seven citizens of Portland were kept waiting for a quarter of an hour for 8 o'clock to come at the east side water office this morning, apparently for the reason that the time for opening the office had not yet come. Three clerks sat inside the office during the time that the seven men who wanted to pay their water bills and get away to their places of business waited outside the door.

ALLEGED COUNTERFEITERS PLEAD NOT GUILTY IN FEDERAL COURT

Three members of the Coon counterfeiting gang were arraigned before Judge Charles F. Wolverton in local United States district court this morning, two of whom pleaded not guilty. Coon, himself, asks that he be given until Monday to plead at which time he would be represented by a lawyer. John H. Williams, the old man of the gang, and Hans Johansson were the other members present in court today. All of the men have served time for counterfeiting. Williams, who is 74 years of age, has spent nearly half his life in penitentiaries in the United States.

You go into a store to be waited on perhaps with purely perfunctory politeness; the clerk isn't really interested in you or your wants; he shows you goods to you, but it appears to make little difference to him whether you buy or not, and really he wants more than half try, if so much, to please you.

"If you do buy and you are to carry your purchase away yourself he sends the goods to be wrapped up and then stands stolidly till they come back. If you don't buy he mechanically re-lays the goods he has taken down to show you, as you rise to depart, and you say to yourself as you go that you will never go there again if you can help it. "Let me tell you, young gentlemen, that there is no salesman with any sort of goods at all to sell but can increase his business and his pay simply by the exercise of real politeness; by taking pains. If he will but seek in good faith, honestly and politely and with real endeavor to satisfy each customer's wants he will find customers coming to him individually when they want things and finding a pleasure in buying of him; he will build up a following, a trade that will go with him, steadily increasing, wherever he goes; and you know what that means; it means money.

"Let me adjure you, young gentlemen, to cultivate and practise a point of genuine politeness."

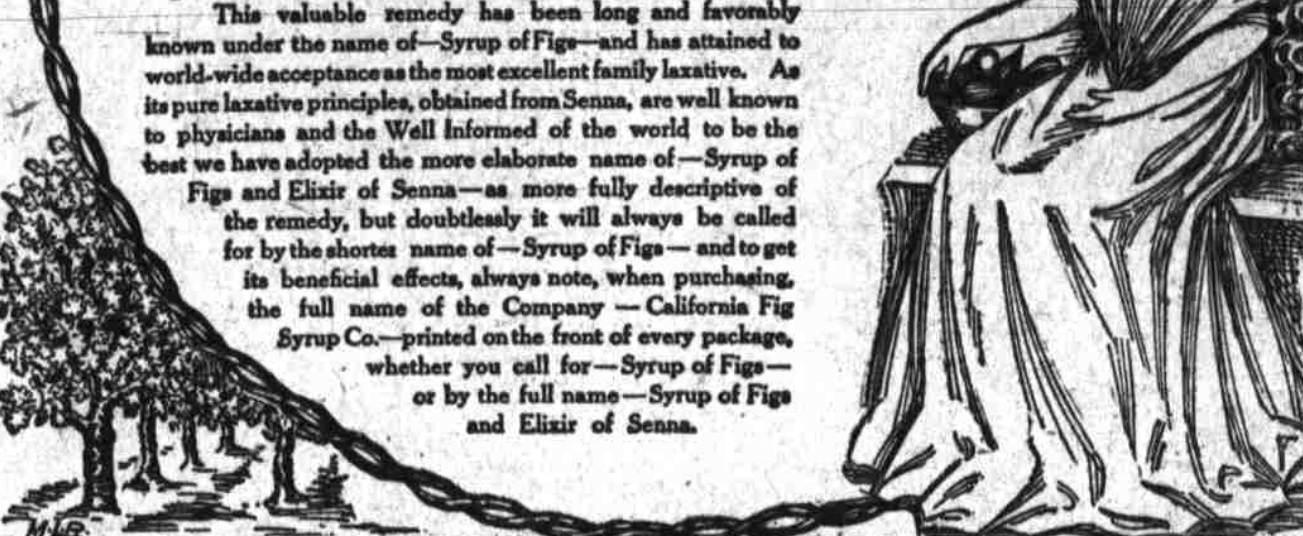
