

JAMESTOWN FAIR

IT IMPRESSES OREGONIAN

Location and Surroundings Ideal, but Hotel Accommodations and Management Bad—Journal First Oregon Newspaper to Present Credentials.

The Jamestown exposition, its delights and its drawbacks, its marvels and its mismanagement, are vividly portrayed in the following letter by Mrs. Sarah A. Evans, who is now there and who attended the convention of the National Editorial association last week at the Journal's accredited representative:

What were my impressions of the Jamestown exposition? Well, if they were of the first 12 hours of my stay, I should say that the very worst thing I have seen since I came to this country, and I have seen a great deal of it, was the Jamestown exposition.

But before the exposition, or any of its surrounding towns were reached, one would begin to be impressed with the lack of system and want of methodical arrangements for the comfort and convenience, and even safety of its visitors. Women particularly. In offering the questions to hold women's conventions at the exposition, the circular, among other things, made a point of easy access, courteous attention and systematic arrangements for conducting visitors to their various places of entertainment.

Dark, Damp, Dismal Depot.

The experience of one party of ladies is typical of many. Instead of reaching Newport News at 8 p. m., the train pulled into dark, damp and dismal depot at 9 p. m.—three hours late. There was neither light, lamp post or guide, and the thing to light the way through the darkness of inky sheds was the crying of the children who were taking a malicious pleasure in the helplessness of lost and wandering women, who had to fumble their way through the darkness, and who were then pitched almost head foremost down a steep gangway onto a board walk where they were met by a crowd of men, some of whom were trying to guess whether they were on the right boat or wrong.

Finally the boat, which was found to be for Norfolk, pulled out, but never a guide appeared to tell the women where to go, and they were left to their own devices, sticking close by one another, whether they were right or wrong.

Out of the darkness and upon our homelike splendor, however, a light appeared in the form of a shabby little "Daughter of the Confederacy," who set us right as to the points of the compass, and told us to leave the boat at the deep sea wharf, from where we could walk to the inside inn, but as it was well past 11 o'clock, we might not be able to get in.

Stranded Into Dark Vessel.
This certainly was encouraging to the dwellers of the plains and the tenderfoot from Oregon, who had descended into the dark hole of the vessel, from which we an hour later climbed up an incline at an angle of 45 degrees onto the "deep sea wharf" and felt relieved to once more feel solid earth beneath our feet and know that somewhere in the dark, dim light we were at the deep sea wharf, where the weary traveler could enjoy all the comforts of home, with oysters, crabs and deep-sea fish thrown in.

But the climb did not end when we viewed the historic waters of Hampton Roads from the deep sea wharf. Up the incline we went, and in the depths of unfathomable sand until in our bewildered state we happened to stumble upon a board walk where in the darkness we were met by a crowd of men, ready to relieve us of our heavy suit cases, upon which we had taken the proverbial grip of "grim death" to the inn where the weary traveler could enjoy all the comforts of home, with oysters, crabs and deep-sea fish thrown in.

HORSE ROUNDUP ON UMATILLA RESERVE

Pendleton, Or., June 18.—A roundup of horses on the Umatilla reservation will take place tomorrow at the public corral on the north fork of McKay creek. About 500 Indian horses scattered over the reservation will be gathered there, and the Indians will invite white men having horses on the reservation to come to the corral on that

day and look over the stock rounded up. There are no more large herds of Indian ponies, as formerly. A Loupink, who once owned about 1,000 head, now has but a few, and Kash Kash, who was once a large owner, has but a small number of saddle horses.
