City Attorney-elect J. P. Kavanaugh will have another assistant city attorney at a salary of \$150 per month if an ordinance sanctioned by the ways and means committee of the council passes that body. The matter was referred to the committee of an assistant up in the meeting yesterday and favorable consideration was given it by the committee. It was cited that City Attorney L. A. McNary had more than his hands full in clearing away the immense amount of city work with the present assisting force. The ordinance provides for the new assistant to begin his duties July 1.

John A. Hertzman, well known in Portland business circles, died last night at the residence of H. L. Pitcock of tuberculosis, from which he had suffered for the past four years. Mr. Hertzman had lived in southern California and Arizona for some time, but the climate did not benefit him. He came to Portland in 1886 and was connected with the O. R. & N. for a time. Later he was bookkeeper for the First National bank. Mr. Hertzman was born in Sweden 39 years ago, and is survived by his wife and a sister, Mrs. W. W. Weller, of Newport. The funeral, which will be private, will be held from the Pitcock residence tomorrow.

For his services as architect to the city in drawing plans for two fire engines during the administration of former Mayor George H. Williams, D. L. Williams yesterday presented to the judicial committee of the council two bills amounting to \$700. The engine houses were not built according to the Williams plans, and the architect intimated to the council that he would settle on a basis of \$500. Installation of officers will be held at the next regular monthly meeting. The following were elected last night: President, J. W. Hawkins; vice-president, John Anderson; secretary, E. J. Grant; financial secretary, O. F. Isaacson; treasurer, M. Anderson; trustees, L. Larson, N. M. Peterson and A. Rosen.

John Cunningham, an ex-convict, was arrested in the north end yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriffs Leonard and Beatty charged with selling fake jewelry through boys who were employed as agents. It is believed that Cunningham is an eastern crook for whose arrest a reward has been offered, and he will be held until information concerning him has been received.

Judge Gantenbein, in the circuit court today is hearing the trial on appeal of the suit of C. L. Harris, a Carlton butcher, against the Frank L. Smith meat company for \$27.86. Harris alleges that he sold meat to Smith worth \$75.78, and that only \$37.92 of the amount was paid. Justice of the Peace Beatty heard the suit and gave judgment for the sum sued for by Harris.

Frightened by a runaway Haslewood team last night, a valuable horse belonging to Frank Griffith plunged through a \$300 plate glass window in the front of Fraley's millinery establishment, Third and Salmon streets. The horse severed an artery and was otherwise injured, but will probably be saved.

MANY MILES OF WATER MAINS

Carloads of Mains Required for Purchasing Rose City Park.

Enough pipe for the laying of 24 miles of water mains will be required in Rose City Park. Much of this has already been received on the grounds and one carload is on the way, which is expected, will arrive shortly. This is six-inch galvanized pipe. Jacobson & Bader are the contractors who have undertaken a portion of this big job.

The Rose City Park water system will be of the circulatory type, admitting of no dead-ends and a perfect circulation of water. A great deal of the system has been completed, water having been quite generally distributed to all parts of the addition west of the present terminal of the streetcar line at the foot of the hill.

Another contract for the extension of the service was let by Hartman & Thompson yesterday afternoon. Water is already being used by the workmen in Rose City Park in the construction of the cement walks and within a few weeks there will be water running in front of every lot in the entire addition.

BRIDGE DECKING ROTTING AWAY

Burnside Structure Badly in Need of Thorough General Overhauling at Once.

No steps have been taken as yet towards the repairs of the Burnside bridge and it is said that the structure is badly in need of a general overhauling. The metal portion of the structure is said to be in good shape except for needing a little tightening up but the woodwork throughout the entire structure is in deplorable condition.

The decking is nearly worn through in many places and the beams extending crosswise over the steel girders are crumbling away. Even those in authority admit it to be only a matter of a short time when the planking will be completely worn through and in a dangerous condition.

Repairs to the bridge would probably have been under way long ago but for a hair-pulling match between the city of Portland and the county of Multnomah. The city owns the bridge and the county is supposed to operate it and keep it in repair. It is in the meaning of the word "repair" that the authorities conflict, the county holding that such repairs as a complete overhauling of the structure is beyond the intent of the agreement.

Bridges Very Busy Now.

The bridges spanning the Willamette river have been unusually busy of late owing to the high water. One day last week the steel bridge swung open 102 times in 24 hours. This broke the record and is believed to even exceed the world-beating records of the busiest bridge spanning Chicago river. The Burnside bridge kept on the move pretty lively too, having made 78 turns during the day.

May was a busy month for during that time the Steel bridge swung open 3,200 times. The Burnside bridge opened 1,500 times, while the Morrison structure turned open in the neighborhood of 900 times. The Madison structure made the average number of turns which is about 700 per month, or one-third the total number of the Steel bridge at the opposite end of the harbor.

Foreman N. Stutsman on the Burnside bridge and Foreman Sam Hall on the steel bridge say they have never been kept so busy turning the draws as during the present year and attribute the increase not only to the high water but also to the greater amount of shipping in the port.
