

RIGHT UP NEXT TO DEL MONTE

Seaside Resort Planned for
Bayocean Park, Near
Bay City.

SANITARIUM ALSO
SOON TO BE BUILT

Ideal Sites for Summer Cottages—
P. R. & N. Builders Crossing Tide
Lands in Front of Town—Heavy
Excavating Machinery on Way.

(Journal Special Service.)

Bay City, Or., June 18.—The line of the P. R. & N. company is now under construction at this place. It is being built across the tide lands of the Bay City Land company in front of town. A. C. U. Berry in charge for the contractors, is authority for the statement that two steam shovels and a locomotive will be landed at Bay City within a month in order that the heavy excavating in the northern part of town may be hurried up and this portion of the 20-mile section, finished in the early summer.

The steamer Elmore came in Sunday from Astoria and after discharging at Bay City left up on the flood tide for Tillamook City.

Sanitarium Projected.

Dr. W. C. Hawk of Jefferson, Oregon, arrived a few days ago and has located here permanently. He has purchased one of the best business corners in town, on which he will erect a fine two-story building to be occupied as a drugstore. He has purchased also two blocks of ground in a most beautiful location overlooking the bay and ocean, on which he will build a sanitarium. Work on this will begin late in the present summer and be prosecuted without interruption until completed. It is expected to have the institution open for guests late in the summer of 1908.

Potter & Chapin have a crew actively at work clearing up and otherwise improving the sand spit across the bay from Bay City.
