

HE YET SINGS OF HIS LOVE

Chester Thompson Leaves
With Friends Verses He
Wrote in Jail.

Tacoma, Wash., June 19.—Before leaving for Walla Walla penitentiary, where he is now incarcerated in the insane ward, Chester Thompson, slayer of Judge George Meade Emory of Seattle, left several poems with friends, out of a large number he has written while in confinement in the county jail here. In a long poem breathing passionate sentiments he alludes to Miss Whittelsey, for love of whom he killed her uncle. Two verses of the poem run as follows:

O fairies, fairies, fairy queen,
Come quickly ere I die
For the lass I love is sweet sixteen,
And Heaven's in her eye.

O save me from this prison gloom,
And bear me to her side!
Till all the world that I'm the groom
And she, my love's the bride.

Seattle Heat & Plumbing company, remodeling heating, \$3,600; heating new hospital, \$2,150; for installing two new boilers, \$2,500; all at state soldiers' home, Orting.
Bowls & Love, Tacoma, electrical supplies for rewiring Western Washington hospital for insane at Fort Steilacoom, \$1,619.15.
The contract for construction of the horticultural hall at the state fair grounds, North Yakima, will probably be awarded to Corbett & Raymond of that city as their several bids are the low ones.
