

TEACHERS ARE BEING CHOSEN FOR PORTLAND SCHOOLS

Included in New List Are Four Principals, Twelve Grade Instructors and Eight High School Assistants— Lents School Appointments Come Later.

The selection of the new teaching staff of the Portland city schools by the directors and Superintendent Rigler finally got together again last night and completed the list, although it is said all was not harmony in the choosing.

No teachers were elected to the newly incorporated Lents school, the board deciding that the best policy would be to name the teachers just before the opening of the school next fall. It was also decided that the election of janitors for the different buildings could be deferred until the next meeting. Salaries were left untouched for the present but it is probable that a meeting will be held soon to make some readjustments.

Four principals, 12 grade teachers and eight high school assistants are included in the new list of instructors and they have been assigned as follows: Charles A. Rice, of Monmouth, to the Clinton-Kelly school; W. L. McKee, of Eugene, to the Davis school; O. R. Dinwiddie, to the Terwilliger, and Miss Addie E. Clark of Oregon City, to the Fulton Park school.

Transfer of Principals. Following are the principals transferred to other schools: Hopkin Jenkins, from the Atkinson to the Holladay school; L. E. Moran, from the Clinton-Kelly to the Chapman; Mrs. A. E. Watson, from the Davis to the East Twenty-eighth; H. M. Sherwood, from the Peninsula to the Mount Tabor; and H. N. Goode, from the Terwilliger to the Glencoe.

The only principal who applied but failed of election was W. E. Covover of the Chapman school. Covover has been principal of the Chapman school for two years, coming to Portland from San Diego, Cal.

Of the other principals who conducted schools during the year, Ella E. McBride of Oregon City resigned as principal of the Atkinson school, E. J. Hadley was appointed probation officer in the juvenile court and left the Holladay school and J. L. Toussay, principal of the Shaver school left the service on account of sickness several months ago.

Mary E. Buxton of Troutdale was also elected to teach but has not yet been assigned. Marion Culver and Gertrude James were added to the teaching force of the east side high school and the west side high school will be reinforced by six new teachers: William Tabor, Carl H. Brauer, Fannie L. Barber, Bessie Hill, F. E. Harrigan and Jean Slauson.

PROTEST AGAINST REFERENDUM ACTION

(Special Dispatch to the Journal).
Lebanon, Or., June 19.—Harmony grange No. 23, at its last meeting adopted resolutions on the referendum situation, as follows:

"Resolved, by Harmony grange No. 23, in regular session assembled, that we deprecate all attempts to muzzle the will of the people and we hereby refuse our assent to any referendum petitions to be placed on file in the secretary of state's office when the intent and purpose of the signers are so plainly apparent, and the omission of a few words in the title of the act to be referred is in all the excuse made, which in no way detracts from its merits or meaning nor could in any manner mislead the signer. We believe these tactics will destroy the usefulness of our referendum law and cause great dissatisfaction to over 7,000 legal voters who signed these petitions and work an irreparable injury to our state. And we would respectfully urge the courts of this state, believing as we do that any measure can safely be introduced to a popular vote of the people, and that any law that will not stand this test should be consigned to utter oblivion."
