State Railway Commission Goes Before Interstate for Relief.

SAME RATE EXACTED AS PROOF ALCOHOL

Twelve Cents Gallon, Carload Lots; Eighteen Cents, Less Than Carload-Discriminates Against Product, as Such, and Dealers in It.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, Or., June 19 .- The state railway commission of Oregon has filed a complaint with the interstate commerce commission in behalf of dealers in and shippers of denatured alcehol in Oregon. The first complaint filed with the state railway commission was that of L. Levinger, a druggist of Baker City, who complained of the excessive charges made on shipments of dena-tured alcohol from Chicago to Baker.

After taking the matter up with the O. R. & N. Co. the commission was informed that denatured alcohol should take the same rate as any other kind of alcohol, as the transcontinental provision for alcohol is unqualified.

Sixteen railway companies, including all that have their doset terminals in the Pacific northwest, are named as defendants. The complaint is filed as "in behalf of dealers in and shippers of denatured alcohol, transported by defendants from Chicago, fillinois, and Missouri river common points to north Pacific coast terminals, including Portland, Astoria, Albina and other points in the state of Oregon."

The gist of the compliaint is contained in the third article, which, in effect, is as follows:

That defendants maintain for the transportation of alcohol, a rate of 55 cents per 100 pounds in less than carloads.

Violation of the statute is charged in that the defendant roads "are subjecting shippers and dealers to unjust discrimination and are giving to the traffic in proof alcohol and dealers in and shippers of it unreasonable advantage."

The state commission prays that the interstate commerce commission make an order "commanding defendants to cease from the aforesaid violations of law; that a further order be entered fixing such a maximum rate as will be fixing such a maximum rate as will be just and reasonable; that the commis-sion prescribe such rules and regula-tions as will prevent the continuance of the exactions."
