

WILL TEST PRODUCTS

Experts on Slabs and Stumps Believe Economic Utilization Can Be Made of Them Capital Desired to Encourage Ideas.

Economic utilization of waste wood products in Portland and the state is to be seriously investigated by the government with a view to encouraging capital to invest in scientific methods of converting slabs and stumps to some practical use. Dr. W. C. Greer of Washington, District of Columbia, will spend the summer in Oregon making a study of the question.

R. S. Kellogg, chief of the branch of wood utilization in the government department of products, has written a letter to the Portland chamber of commerce, advising its officials of Dr. Greer's plans, and has been urged by the chamber to make use of its facilities for gaining any information he may require in going about his work. It is said he will make headquarters here and will extend his investigations over the states of Oregon and Washington, his undertaking is regarded in the light of a very important step by the federal government, that may result in developing a great industry in the northwestern timber regions.

It is known that millions of dollars worth of chemical products of wood are going to waste every year in Oregon and Washington. The falling of trees, the rotting of the tops and stumps, and the waste of whole trees felled by nature's processes, the wasting of thousands of carloads of sawwood and sawdust from Oregon sawmills, represent vast losses in various chemical products that could be saved by the proper processes.

Mr. Kellogg, writing of Dr. Greer's mission, said: "Utilization of waste wood products is a question of growing importance in this country. Dr. Greer is a forest service expert on wood distillation. He will study mill waste and stumps of Douglas fir and other coniferous trees, to learn the amount of turpentine and chemical products to be obtained from them."

COUNCIL IS AFTER TRUST

Sellwood's first attempt to drive a spike into the Portland plumbing trust, through the adoption of a resolution presented to the council yesterday afternoon by Councilman Willis asking for the abolition of the plumbers' board of examiners and the correction of other ordinances which favor the combine, resulted in the resolutions being presented to a special committee, which will investigate conditions.

Councilman Willis had the following resolution to offer the council: "Resolved, That the city attorney be and is hereby directed to revise and report to the committee on plumbing and drainage at the earliest available time, ordinance No. 14,110, entitled 'An ordinance regulating the plumbing, venting and drainage of buildings and to provide for the registration of plumbers, with a view to abolishing the board of plumbing examiners provided for by said ordinance.'"

Alderman Ruslight, as soon as the resolution was presented, stated he believed that Sellwood residents had been wrongly informed on the subject and asked that the matter be referred to a special committee. Councilman Gray, who occupied the chair in the absence of Mayor Lane, who was attending the Pioneer's meeting, appointed Councilmen Annand, Wallace and Bennett, and they will act as the special committee to investigate the conditions referred to.

AGED NEWBERG MAN FALLS DEAD IN YARD

MAGAZINES NOT REVOLUTIONARY

Defense Receives Blow When Judge Rules on Admissibility of Evidence.

Boise, Ida., June 20.—Judge Wood administered a serious rebuke to the defense in the Haywood case today when in ruling regarding the admissibility of articles in the miners' magazine he held that because the defendant was an officer of the union and he was responsible for the publication, and that because the articles offered as evidence indicated animosity toward Frank Steunenberg, Judge Goddard et al. they were admissible.

Darrow and Richardson held that the ruling was unjust, but Wood ruled, however, that all matter offered was acceptable excepting those published after the death of Steunenberg. A great portion of the morning session was spent in Borah monotonously reading this documentary evidence. As a matter of fact the extracts read were hardly of a revolutionary character, being more in line with ordinary utterances of trade journals. The courtials naturally were class matter but entirely without advocacy of radical incineration.

Borah, after finishing, offered in evidence the Colorado decision of the supreme court overturning the eight-hour law. The defense objected but the court admitted it, declaring it showed that the decision was rendered in Colorado and Borah also got before the jury the decision in the Meyer habers corpus proceedings.

Borah spent most of the afternoon session in reading the opinion of the Colorado supreme court on the habers corpus proceedings brought on account of Meyer while he was under arrest at Telluride for deserting the flag. Previous to this digression was permitted in order to let Kerwan, secretary-treasurer, testify relative to the make up of the executive board, the duties of the officers, etc., and the introduction of telegraph records to show the payment of money to Adams at Ogden, payments of money to Orchard at San Francisco and other minor matters connected with Orchard's testimony. E. M. Stewart, engineer at the Trade Dollar mine, testified that Haywood frequently during the 1890 trouble, had declared that Steunenberg was a monster and a tyrant and should be exterminated.

The state expects to rest tomorrow and it is likely that the defense will ask to postpone opening until Monday when Darrow will give Haywood's side.

FEMALE CROOK STEALS PURSE

Woman Sneak Thief Takes Teachers' Pocketbooks at Ladd School.

With all the sang froid and cunning of the most dangerous crooks, a clever female sneak thief pursued her nefarious calling in "the lady school" Park and Jefferson streets yesterday afternoon, and as a result of her operations two teachers suffered the loss of their purses.

Shortly after noon yesterday a well-dressed woman about 40 years of age entered the office of the principal of the school and requested permission to use the telephone. After consulting the telephone directory the stranger left without calling a number.

Shortly afterward it was discovered that Miss Inghall's purse containing \$10 and a reticule belonging to another teacher were missing. The purse of the former was found in a yard on Columbia, between Fifth and Sixth streets, at 7:30 o'clock last night. From information in possession of the school authorities it is believed that the crook is the same woman who operated in Vancouver, Washington, some time ago, and upon a description furnished the detectives are securing the city for her.

Joe Fitzpatrick reported to the police this morning that he invited H. J. Shuldon to share his room in the Laurel house, Third and Pine streets, last night and upon arising found that his friend had decamped with a gray coat and \$10 in gold coin.

W. Howell, residing in room 54, 515 Third street, complains that sneak thief effected an entrance to his room last night by forcing the lock of the door and carried away a suit of clothes. Howell believes the sudden departure of his room mate may have had something to do with the disappearance of the garments.

Frances Miller informed the police today that Frank Wherry, 23 years of age, borrowed her \$35 gold watch last Sunday and for some inexplicable reason has failed to return the timepiece. The young woman fears the absent minded young man may have pawned the watch and has asked the police to recover her property.

W. M. Van Bibber, rooming in the Abbey Hotel, 2314 Washington street, reports that a burglar entered his room Tuesday night and annexed a suit of clothes, a pair of pants, a gold watch chain and a bloodstone and quartz locket.

No arrests have been made as the result of any of the cases reported.

TOTTENHAM HITS ROCK

The British steamer Tottenham, Captain Mann, laden from this port for China, struck a rock yesterday in approaching the coast of Japan. She put into Kobe leaking. Examination shows that 14 plates were damaged. The vessel will go into drydock before proceeding.

The Tottenham left Portland May 25, bound for Shanghai with a cargo of 3,800,000 feet of lumber. The cargo was dispatched by the Pacific Export Lumber company.

The Tottenham is better known here than any of the tramps engaged in the Pacific ocean trade, having been here three times recently.

BLOCKADING WAGON CAUSED SMALL RIOT

Half a dozen butchers in their white aprons started a small riot in front of Friedman's market, between Stark and Washington streets, this afternoon when a motorman alighted from a street car and attempted to back one of the delivery wagons off the track where it was obstructing the passage of the car. The driver had refused to back his horse when asked to do so by the carman and the latter took the matter in his own hands. All the butchers in the market rushed to the driver's assistance and a large crowd collected to witness the impending scrimmage. A call was sent to police headquarters and Patrolman Riley hurried to the scene of trouble. The difficulty was settled without making any arrests.

LONE BRIGAND MAKES HAUL IN CALIFORNIA
