

ROUTE OF BIG PARADE

Where to View Portland's First Annual Rose Show Formation and How the Divisions Will March.

The following is the line of march for the big parade tomorrow:

East on Couch to Tenth, south on Tenth to Alder, west on Alder to Eleventh, south on Eleventh to Morrison, east on Morrison to Seventh, south on Seventh to Yamhill, east on Yamhill to Sixth, north on Sixth to Morrison, east on Morrison to Third, north on Third to Pine, west on Pine to Fourth, south on Fourth to Washington, west on Washington to Forestry building, where the committee has made arrangements for a grouped picture. The parade section will form in the divisions as follows:

First division—Herald, platoon of police, Grand Marshal McDowell and aides, Third Infantry band, Portland Hunt club, officers of rose fests in automobiles, judges in automobiles, United States Flagship Charleston band, Admiral Swinburne and officers of the Charleston and John Paul Jones in automobiles. This division will form on Alder street, facing east, with right resting on Eleventh street.

The second division will be made up as follows:

All entries of class A, De Caprio's band, Push club, Portland and suburbs, all-Oregon floats, fraternal society floats, Brown's band, tallies (four or more horses), carriages and teams, special feature floats, Chemawa band, trade floats.

This division will form on Twelfth street, facing north, with right resting on Alder.

The third division will form as follows:

All entries in class B, Everett's band, saddle ponies, saddle ponies tandem, saddle ponies pairs, saddle horses, saddle horses tandem, saddle horses in pairs, bicycles, Tomlinson band, pony and cart two wheels, pony and cart four wheels, pony carriage and pair, horse and cart, horses and buggies, carriages and pairs, tallies (four or more horses), Oaks band on tallies.

This division will form on Thirteenth street, facing north, with right resting on Alder.

The parade section will take up the line of march as soon as the automobile section clears, and will move from Eleventh and Alder south on Eleventh to Morrison, east on Morrison to Third, north on Third to Pine, west on Pine to Fourth, south on Fourth to Washington, west on Washington to Ninth, where the marching elements will fall out and take cars to the Forestry building. The parade section will then proceed to the fair grounds.

PREVENT FAMINE BY BURNING OIL

Willamette River Steamers Abandon Cordwood Fuel As Too Expensive.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Salem, Or., June 19.—There is a price for obtaining the same is so high and so difficult that the Oregon City Transportation company, which operates boats from Portland to Corvallis via Salem, has decided to equip all its boats with oil burners. In fact, the step has already been taken and the Altona has been equipped with using wood.

The state of the river is becoming low and the trip as far as Corvallis will have to be abandoned before long. Here at Salem the Willamette is now but two and three tenths feet above low-water mark.

Whitwood is in great demand here and second growth fir is being contracted for in large quantities at \$3.90. First-class big fir cannot be had and oak is selling at \$5 and \$6 per cord. One of the reasons ascribed for this rise in cordwood is the fact that wages for wood choppers and wood cutters are exceptionally low when compared with various sorts of employment, and that easier work is now available. Then the forests are being pretty well stripped of their cordwood. In the woods second growth cordwood is selling at \$2.50 and wood haulers also are scarce.

THIS HORSE THIEF BOUND TO GRAND JURY

Ed Smith, Alias Miller, Waived a Preliminary Examination in Police Court Today.

Ed Smith, alias Miller, the self-confessed horse thief, arrested yesterday by Deputy Sheriff Bulger, waived a preliminary examination in the police court this morning and was bound over to await the action of the grand jury in the sum of \$1,500.

It is alleged that Smith stole a valuable horse belonging to Dr. Sandford White from Ladd's pasture, on the Canyon road, and sold the animal to P. C. Earl for \$40. The prisoner also is accused of purloining another animal from the same place, which he disposed of to Jeff Rippa of Second and Main streets for \$175. Smith collected \$10 on account from the buyer and upon returning for the balance of the purchase price was taken into custody.

After being locked up in the county jail, Miller made a full confession of his wrongdoing. It is believed by the authorities that the defendant is the leader of a well-organized gang of rustlers who have been reaping a harvest throughout the county for several months. Smith was run down by officers of the law through a bridge stolen from Pierce's pasture and which was used by the thief on the two horses stolen.

PRACTICAL JOKERS HAD FUN WITH JAMES KEPCHA

Believing that his team had been stolen from in front of the courthouse, James Kepcha, superintendent of one of the county road divisions, hunted all over the city in the hot sun for five hours yesterday afternoon before he realized that he had been made the victim of a practical joke. At the end of his search he found his team tied just one block from where he had left them.

Kepecha tied his team at the corner of Fourth and Salmon streets at 1 o'clock while he went into the courthouse to transact some business. When he came out of the building in a short time he found that his team was gone, and he at once began to hunt for them. He hunted all over the city, but failed to go around the block.

At 6 o'clock Kepcha returned to the courthouse to report the theft to the sheriff. When he left the building again, he looked up the street and saw the team tied at Fourth and Main streets just a block from where he had left them.

KHURY SHOWS THAT HE IS A GOOD PROVIDER

Admitting that her husband, Najib Khury, had given her \$30 a month regularly, Mrs. Louise Khury appeared in the county court this morning to prosecute him on the charge of failing to support her. The last money her husband gave her, she said, was on May 29 when he gave her \$18. Khury on his own behalf said his wife had left him in January, and that he had given her all of his earnings since then, some-

times leaving it on the doorstep when she refused to accept it. Khury said he frequently had to borrow money to pay his own board with, having given all his earnings to his wife.

Khury expressed his willingness to support his wife, and said he had always done so. He agreed to continue paying her \$30 a month and the case was dismissed. The couple were married at Vancouver a year ago today. Mrs. Khury was formerly Mrs. Trevor.

COMMITTEE WILL CONTINUE WORK

Workers for Country Club Doing Splendid Things—Still at Work.

The soliciting committee of the Portland Country Club and Live Stock association held a meeting at the parlors of the Portland Commercial club this morning at 9:30 o'clock. Reports of those present showed that \$7,000 had already been signed up, and a number of the committee are still making final report. The committee will not cease work during the rose festivities, but an active campaign will be conducted next Monday and Tuesday and another meeting will be held Wednesday morning at 9:30 in the Commercial club parlors.

One of the most satisfactory features of this undertaking is that stock is being subscribed for by residents of all portions of Oregon and many are volunteering subscriptions before being called upon. The success of the recent livestock shows at Corvallis and in other parts of the state was discussed before the committee this morning. Editorials from the Breeders' Gazette and other livestock journals were read, showing the necessity for an annual livestock show of international importance in the northwest.

JUDGE MURPHY PASSES AWAY

Aged Clerk of the Supreme Court Drops Dead While on Way to His Club.

For many years clerk of the Oregon state supreme court passed suddenly away last evening near the east steps of the Marion county court house and was discovered a little before 9 o'clock in the evening by Sheriff W. J. Culver, who was making his usual evening round about the court house premises.

Judge Murphy left the Bennett home, where he and his wife were temporarily staying at 7:30, intending to go to the postoffice to mail a letter.

From the postoffice he is supposed to have wandered his way toward the clubhouse of which he was an active member, but while crossing or near the court house grounds he was seized with a stroke of paralysis and went to the east steps to rest, where he was seen sitting after 8 o'clock by Harriet, the 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. T. Rigdon, who was passing by. She saw him arise and walk around to the north side of the steps and lean against the building. She paid no further attention to the aged man, although she knew him well and was a favorite among the judge's youthful acquaintances.

Sometime after Judge Murphy's body was found lifeless by Sheriff Culver, who chanced to pass by on his round to the jail quarters. He summoned Dr. J. N. Smith and Dr. J. Reynolds also appeared early on the scene, but they could be of no assistance, as the life was extinct.

Judge Murphy was born in Ireland 75 years ago and came to the United States when but a mere child and settled with his parents at Brooklyn, New York. He came to California and subsequently in 1880 located at Champoux in Marion county, Oregon. He served as justice of the peace for many years, was postal inspector and for the past 16 years was clerk of the supreme court. He was obliging and courteous to newspapermen and to the callers at the supreme court and a tireless worker. He was a Mystic Shriner and an Odd Fellow.

In 1875 he was married to Mrs. Stephen Church, who with their only son, Chester Murphy of Portland, survives him. Mrs. Murphy has two other children, Mrs. A. J. Giesy and Mrs. L. G. Clarke, both of Portland.

The funeral of the late J. J. Murphy, clerk of the Oregon Supreme court, will be held Friday at 2:30 o'clock from the First Congregational church and services will probably be conducted by the Masonic lodge. He was a member of Champoux Masonic lodge at Champoux, Oregon.

PORTLAND BOY WINS PRIZE AT UNIVERSITY

University of Oregon, Eugene, June 20.—Wilson C. Nicholas, a sophomore at the university from Portland, was awarded the Bennett prize yesterday. The subject that Nicholas chose was the transportation problems of the day, and the judges said that a very satisfactory remedy was pointed out. The prize is \$20 in money. The conditions state that the prize shall be awarded to the best essay on subjects dealing with American government.

Nicholas is the son of a Portland lawyer and is a prominent student.

GREAT AQUEDUCT IS COMMENCED

Gigantic Project for Supplying New York With Water Will Cost Great Sum.

Feekskill, N. Y., June 20.—With impressive ceremonies near here today work was formally inaugurated in one of the greatest engineering undertakings in the world's history, the aqueduct which is to supply New York City with water from the Catskill mountain region. The aqueduct will be the greatest of ancient or modern times. It will cost \$161,000,000—\$20,000,000 in excess of the estimated cost of the Panama canal and 30 times the cost of the Corinth canal, which the Roman empire, under Nero, undertook but did not finish.

A large official party from New York City participated in the ceremonies marking the inauguration of the work of construction. Bishop Potter offered prayer; J. Edward Simmons, president of the board of water supply, made the welcoming address, and Mayor McClellan delivered the principal address of the day. Charles N. Chadwick made the formal presentation of the aqueduct to the contractors and the exercises were brought to a close with a benediction by Right Rev. Father Lavella, vicar-general of the diocese of New York.

It is estimated that it will take between 15 and 20 years to complete the aqueduct. When finished it will introduce 100,000,000 gallons every 24 hours, led under the Hudson river more than 100 miles away from the seven artificial lakes to be constructed in the Catskills, and of these sources that at Ashokan alone will contain more water than all three of the lakes of Killarney.

HOOD RIVER'S FIRST AUTO STARTS PANIC

Hood River, June 20.—An automobile, belonging to G. J. Geasling, manager of the Hood River Milling company, caused a panic among Hood River horses here yesterday and three runaways was the result. The auto is the first one to be put in use at Hood River and equines apparently resent the innovation. Two vehicles were smashed by the frenzied horses attached to them running into supports to buildings and the other team ran some distance before it could be controlled. The absence of drivers from the colliding wagons probably averted serious injury to them, as they struck with such violence as to free the horses, who continued their mad run and were not caught until some time afterward.

ANARCHISTS PLOTTING TO ASSASSINATE KING

WILL INSTALL FISH LADDER

Traction Company Promises to Rush Its Work at the Cazadero Dam.

(Journal Special Service.)

State Will Conduct an Experimental Fish Hatchery Below the Dam to Ascertain if It Is Possible for Salmon to Thrive There.

Revised plans for the construction of a fish ladder to be installed by the Portland Railway, Light & Power company at the Cazadero dam have been completed and construction work is to begin at once so that it will be completed by July 31 in order to comply with the order of the state board of fish commissioners.

For two years salmon have not been able to pass above the dam constructed by the corporation on the upper Clackamas river at Cazadero. Such obstruction of trout or salmon streams is contrary to the state law, which provides that there must be a free passage way for fish over all dams constructed in this state.

Attention of the officials of the street railway company was called to the violation and the law will be complied with at the earliest possible moment, said Manager Fuller this morning.

In addition to this the state, under the guidance of H. G. Van Dusen, master fish warden, will conduct an experimental hatchery below the dam to see if the salmon may be held there in a healthy condition for spawning purposes. A fine lot of Chinook salmon has already been trapped out it is early yet to say whether the effort to keep them in suitable condition will be satisfactory.

Since the construction of the dam the hatchery on the upper river has been practically out of business because the salmon could not make the jump over the dam. Should the experiment now being made below the dam not be satisfactory the fish ladder will have to be depended upon to supply the hatchery above the dam.

According to the latest plan the fish ladder will be eight feet wide instead of four, as was at first thought sufficient. The enlarged plan was adopted at the instance of the fish commission.

The steamer Potter will begin its seasonal daily passenger service between Portland and Ilwaco beaches June 25, leaving Portland at 10:30 a. m. and arriving at Ilwaco at 4 p. m. The steamer will make the trip Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays. Its leaving time will vary with the tide. While the round-trip fare will remain the same as last year (\$4 on ordinary days and \$3.50 on Saturdays), the Saturday ticket will be good to return on the following Monday, as well as on Sunday.
