The fans who chose a baseball game yesterday in preference to fiesta doings were well rewarded by an 11-inning thriller in which Portland snatched the victory from Oakland after the visitors had secured a lead of one. It was a clean, fast game with but a single error to mar it.

The Beavers now have six straight victories to their credit and their percentage is jumping like a grasshopper in springtime.

Bobby Groom was on the firing line for the locals and, though he gave his usual number of bases on balls, he kept the five hits wide apart and came very near to scoring a shut-out. It was in the ninth inning, with the figures 1 to 0 in favor of Portland that a base on balls, a steal and a safe swat evened up matters and called for the extra innings. In the eleventh came the only error of the game and it helped Oakland on to another tally. Mott juggled a grounder by Van Halren and the latter was safe. Groom soaked Heilmuller. Eagan's grounder was used to put out Van Halren and a walk to Elias filled the bases and called for the extra inning.

Luckily, Haley's shot was gathered in by Schimpf and the side was out.

Then the Beavers showed their batting stuff. Donahue dropped one in a bald spot beyond second, McCredie shot one by Hogan and Moore beat his bunt to first, filling the bases with nobody out. Carson fouled out and the fans held their breaths. Up came Schimpf, who put one past Eagan, Donahue and McCredie romped home and the game was over.

Portland has shoved Oakland down into second place again.

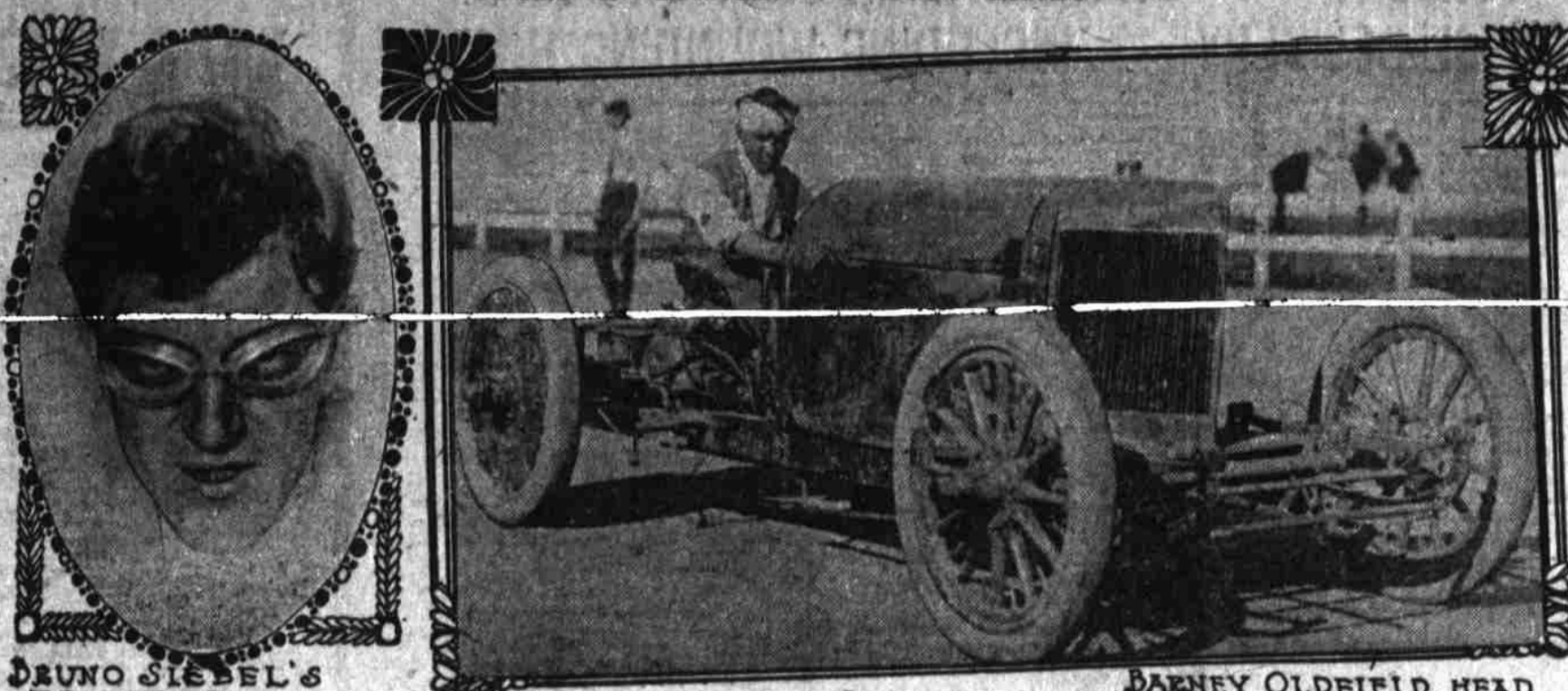

NINE RACES ON FOR TOMORROW

List of Entries for Oldfield Automobile Speed Meet at Irvington Track.

Tomorrow's auto races at the Irvington track will begin at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon. The first day's entertainment will consist of 10 events, including the fiesta sweepstakes, which will be run in three heats. Only two heats will be run tomorrow, the finals being reserved for Sunday's program. The proceeds of the meet will be spent in good roads improvement by the Portland Auto Club, which has the meet in charge.

Entries are still open for all the events. Six riders are in the three-mile motor cycle race. The entries so far received for tomorrow's races are: First Event—Motorcycles, from three to five miles. Fred Nowatney, O. Schneider, R. B. Mitchell, George Mitchell, E. Smithson, George Herron.

Second Event—Fully equipped touring cars, costing less than \$2,000, 10 miles. Tourist, Mitchell, Reo, Tourist.

Third Event—For fully equipped cars, Cadillac, Ford, Pope-Hartford, Cadillac, Ford, Pope-Hartford.

Fourth Event—Novelty race, open to all cars, Cadillac, Ford, Pope-Hartford and two Stevens Duryas, six cylinders.

Fifth Event—Exhibition by Bruno Siebel, the Flying Dutchman.

Sixth Event—Exhibition by Barney Oldfield.

If the Cincinnati club had picked up no other first-class man this season but Mitchell, it could count itself extremely fortunate."

WANT CHILD TO COMFORT MANIAC

Fight for Possession of Baby Girl Discloses Traces of Big Scandal.

San Bernardino, Cal., June 21.—Mrs. Rena M. Luttrell has come all the way from Pittsburg for her 6-year-old niece Katherine Good, hoping that the child's presence will aid in restoring the reason of her mother, Mrs. Martha A. Good, confined in an asylum at Diamond, Pennsylvania. Mrs. W. Y. Stewart, who has reared the child, refuses Mrs. Luttrell's demand for the girl's return. Mrs. Luttrell asserts prior right. She has been determined to make an earnest legal fight, though a mysterious dispatch was received from Pittsburg calling a temporary halt to proceedings, the man who has been paying for the child's support, writing that he hopes to settle the dispute without court proceedings. Who the wealthy individual is, what relation he is to the girl and why such strenuous efforts are being made to hush the affair are an inexplicable puzzle which gives promise of a sensation if the case goes to trial.

CALIFORNIA TO BID FOR OREGON TRADE

Road Is Being Built to Northern Mines to Recover Lost Business.

Yreka, Cal., June 21.—Deputy County Surveyor Harvey J. Sarter, with a corps of assistants, is "viewing out" a line for a new wagon road connecting the present county road on Horse creek with Blue Lodge, a series of good roads on the Siskiyou mountains. The supervisors have signified their willingness to start work immediately. There are several hundred men working in the Joe creek country and several large mines are being developed. All this trade has gone into Oregon, while the mining camp is in California. A good road, with an easy grade, is to be built and an effort made to divert this trade, or part of it, into Siskiyou county.

NORTHROP PUTS OUT BELLINGER

Local Favorite Beaten in Tennis by Eastern College Champion.

Dan Bellinger, another of Portland's first-rank men in the batting of the elusive tennis ball, is out of the Ladd tournament, which has been in progress at the Multnomah club courts all week. Bellinger was defeated yesterday by Northrop, an eastern college champion, who has but recently come to Portland. Tuesday Bellinger showed that he was in fine form by defeating E. B. McAlpin by a very one-sided score, though he was compelled to owe odds of 15 2-6. He was beaten nearly as badly yesterday as he himself beat McAlpin, though the men met on nearly even terms. Bellinger owed Northrop, but two points in six games, but he succeeded in annexing only four games in the match, and Northrop would undoubtedly have won from him had both played at scratch. Northrop is a great net player, strong at volleying and smashing and covering the court in fine style. In the back court he had a strong drive, both forehand and backhand, with which he pleased Bellinger repeatedly. Northrop's showing yesterday proves him as one of the possibilities for the state championship this year. His next victim in the Ladd tournament will be Turner, the two men playing at even terms.

The odds men have been going out fast in the Ladd tournament, and there are now but four left, Northrop, Turner, Ewing and Herdman. Ewing and Herdman have only played one match each, while Northrop has played two and Turner three. Excepting Bellinger, Benham was the most heavily handicapped man to go to the wall yesterday. Benham succumbed to Blanchard, whom he was compelled to owe 15 2-6 and give 15. The closest match of the day was that between Herdman and Wilder, both owe 15 1-6 men, who met on even terms. Herdman, to the surprise of many, won the match by clever smashing and well-placed shots. The match went to three sets, 6-2, 3-6, 6-2. Herdman stands a good chance of reaching the finals in the upper half. Thorne, a scratch man, won his second match yesterday by beating Sargent, 6-4, 4-6, 6-3. Sargent received 15 2-6. One other match was played during the day. Turner (owe 15 3-6) defeated Wartner (receive 15 3-6), 6-3, 8-6.
