

MET DEATH IN HORRIBLE FORM

Thomas L. Dixon, Telegraph Operator, Ground to Death Under Train Wheels.

Thomas L. Dixon, a 19-year-old youth, employed as an operator by the Western Union Telegraph company, met death in a most horrible form yesterday afternoon in the Northern Pacific terminal yards by being ground to death beneath the wheels of a freight train. There were absolutely no eye witnesses to the tragedy and the manner in which the young telegrapher came to his death will go down in the records of the coroner's office as an unsolved mystery.

The mutilated body of the unfortunate man was found about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon by G. Green, who was walking through the yards. The corpse which had been cut in twain, was lying across one of the rails and presented a terrible spectacle. Green hastily notified the coroner and the remains were removed to Finley's undertaking parlors.

Although Coroner Finley diligently searched for some person who may have witnessed the gruesome affair yet his efforts were futile. It is the consensus of opinion that Dixon while crossing the tracks was struck by a moving freight train. Inquiry among the yard crews, however, failed to bring to light any railway employe who saw the sad accident.

Frank R. Dixon, brother of the deceased, is employed as a clerk in the Southern Pacific freight sheds and it was the custom of young Dixon to visit his relative every afternoon on the way to reach the office in the freight depot. It was necessary for Dixon to pass through the yards and it is thought that while on his way to visit his brother death overtook him.

Deceased had been in the employ of the Western Union for five years and by faithful and conscientious work had risen from a position as check boy to operator. Dixon resided at 51 North Park street and was held in great esteem by a host of friends. Coroner Finley has decided not to hold an inquest, owing to the impossibility of securing any witnesses. No arrangements for the funeral have as yet been made.

COUNCIL MAY REPEAL FIREWORKS MEASURE

Very likely the ordinance regulating the sale of fireworks will be repealed at the next meeting of city council on account of some of its objectionable features in relation to the handling of Fourth of July explosives by the shopkeepers. The matter was thoroughly discussed at the meeting of the fire commission yesterday and it developed that shopkeepers at present were unable to sell explosives without breaking the city ordinance, no permits having been issued by Chief Campbell for their sale.

Secretary Weidler of the commission explained the ordinance which prohibits the sale of fireworks except in brick blocks. Explosives cannot be sold by merchants who handle tobacco, cigars or drygoods. Last Fourth fireworks were sold without written permits. The ordinance has been in force since 1903.

Calvin ordered a certified copy of his marriage certificate, and waited until it had been prepared for him. He was married on June 15, 1905, to Nettie Gray, who was then only 15 years old. Calvin was 24 at the time of his marriage. He works at night for the Portland Rendering company, and was living with his wife in furnished rooms on East Stark street.

The landlady was not satisfied to have

Calvin at home all day, and put the young couple out. Calvin obtained the certified copy of the marriage record to present to the next landlady who grows curious.

NORTHERN BOOSTERS TRY TO DECEIVE

Seattle and Tacoma boosters are still trying through the Washington railway commission to bolster up the sound's claims as a wheat shipping center, as against the more advantageous location that nature has provided at Portland. The commission is giving a hearing at Olympia on the question of joint rates from all O. R. & N. points in eastern Washington on wheat that could be hauled over Hill lines to the sound.

R. B. Miller, J. G. Wilson and Zera Snow are at Olympia to represent the Hartman lines, which are resisting the plans of the sound boosters as regards routing of wheat export shipments from interior warehouses to tidewater. The Hill lines also are opposed to the joint rate, as their purpose is to haul the wheat down the Columbia river as soon as the north bank line is completed.
