As was exclusively forecasted in this report yesterday there was an advance of 50c a ton today in coarse and fine salt of California manufacture. Baics were advanced 10c. The salt market is in a firmer position than ever, today's advance only adding to the strength of an already strong market. While it is reported that the salt manufacturers of the Pacific coast have a sirt of working agreement as to price, this cannot be confirmed. In any event all refineries are quoting the advance. Eggs Show Bad Quality.

Even at the high prices now ruling in the local market the eggs now being received are not of best quality. It is very hard at this time to find firstclass eggs and consequently there is much complaint from the trade. Receipts, complaint from the trade. Receipts, while not heavy, are again more liberal, it being quite probable that present arrivals have been held by country speculators in the hope of still higher prices. That it does not pay to hold eggs at this time of the year is shown by the returns received by shippers of off-quality. Along the street today eggs are ranging from 22c to 22½c, with small lots selling once in a while as high as 23c.

Poultry is close to Bottom.

Poultry prices have of late shown a severe break and the market is still showing weak character. Receipts, while not heavy, are more liberal than the requirements of the trade justified, for on a downward market dealers purchase only from hand to mouth because of the expectation of still lower values. Sales of hens were made during the past 24 hours down to 12c. Springs are weakest and these stocks can be purchased at prices that ruled on hens a few days ago. Practically nothing doing at this time in either ducks or geese.

Bastern Potatoes Sell Well. Three cars of eastern potatoes unloaded by McKinley Mitchell this morning have all been sold. Quality is first-class. The trade is badly mixed as regards prices on old potatoes, some selling best stock as low as \$3, while others experience little difficulty in obtaining \$3.50.
