In the death chamber at the morgue where lay the remains of George Hibbins, who was shot and killed Wednesday evening by C. H. Reynolds, two women met face to face yesterday afternoon—Mrs. Dora Hibbins, widow of the murdered man, and Mrs. C. H. Reynolds, the woman who lured him to his death.

No one heard what passed between the women at this strange meeting. Between them lay the body of the murdered man, the dead husband of one and lover of the other. Whether they dared express what stirred within them in the room of death neither would disclose. At any rate, Mrs. Hibbins retired quickly and demanded of the coroner that the other woman be removed. Her request was granted.

The particular portion of the charter relied upon to support this contention is article 7, section 73, and especially subdivision 4, thereof. In the opinion of the court the supreme court of Oregon has held contrary to the contention of defendant Palmer vs. state of Oregon, 2 Oregon 66.
