

HAU BEING PERSECUTED

American Citizen Suffers Torture at Hands of His German Captors—Effort Is Being Made to Place the Matter Before the Kaiser.

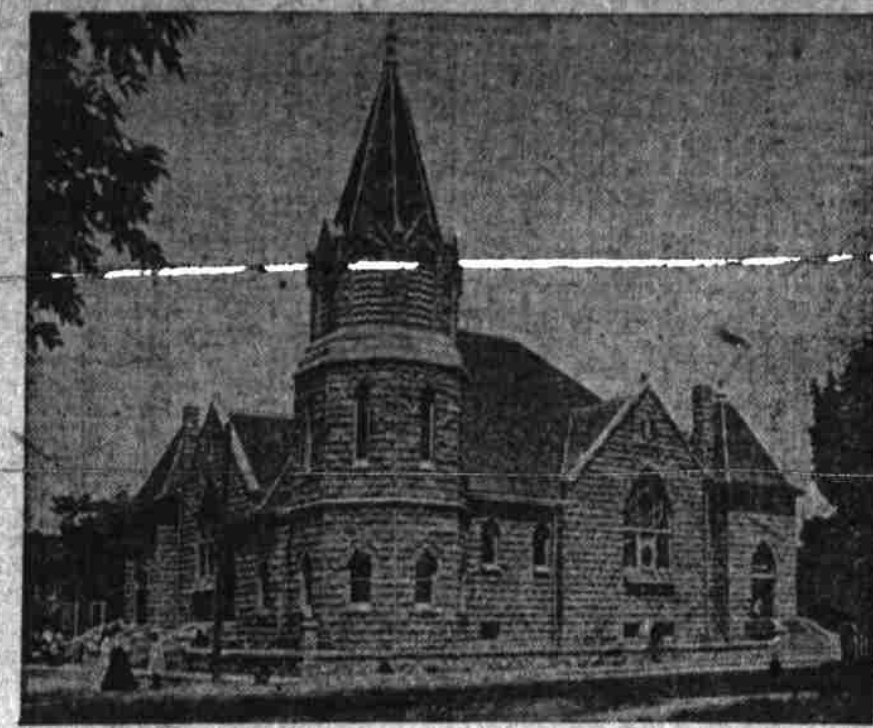

Carlsruhe, Germany, June 22.—Charging that Carl Hau, the Washington university professor and an American citizen, was being hounded to death by the medieval torture methods of the German police, American residents and visitors in Germany are raising a cry for fair play for Hau which promises to penetrate even the walls of the imperial palace.

Hau is held on a charge of murdering his mother-in-law, who was shot at Baden-Baden last November. He was arrested two days later on a charge of having killed her, extradited and for the last six months has been imprisoned here awaiting trial.

Less than a month ago, after the suicide of his wife, sensational statements were given out by the police that Hau had confessed following the delivery to the police of a note written by Mrs. Hau, in which she implicated her husband. The story has since been proved absolutely untrue by American friends of Hau and investigation resulting from this incident has disclosed the barbarous treatment to which the prisoner has been subjected. Solitary confinement, midnight awakenings, rude nervous shocks of every description were employed by the authorities on this man, who is an American subject. Still Hau, calm and persistent in his declaration of innocence, remained unruffled, though subjected to treatment beside which the most heartless third-degree methods of American police would seem mere child play.

The action of interested Americans is spreading all over Europe and probably will take the form of a petition to the German officials before many days.

Cause of Stammering.
From the St. Louis Globe-Democrat.
"Stammering is often more the result of habit than from any defect of the vocal organs," says Professor B. L. Pavyer. "It is generally, if not always, caused by a spasm of the larynx, resulting from nervous contraction of the organs, thus refusing to permit a proper flow of the air current producing tone. People rarely or never stammer when singing, for then the attention is divided between words and music, the nervousness is momentarily forgotten and the passage of the air current through the larynx is continuous and unobstructed."

"Stammering very often is the result of imitation, sometimes intentional, sometimes unconscious, and the affliction is much more general than might be supposed. In one comparatively small section of the city there are 35 stammerers, and every one of them is able to demonstrate to his own satisfaction not only that he does not stammer very badly, but that some other person he knows stammers a great deal worse than himself. Every stammerer is intensely sensitive about his infirmity, rarely forgives and never does forget any allusion to it which in his mind savors of ridicule."

Canadian Peers Without Heirs.

It is a noteworthy and curious fact that of the three Canadian peers not one has an heir male to continue it. Lord Strathcona's title will presumably descend one day to his daughter, Mrs. Howard, who will thus add another to the small and select company of peeresses in their own right. Lord Mount Stephen, though he has been twice married, has no children; and the one other Canadian peerage, that of Macdonald, of Bunscliff, is now held by the widow of the first Lord Macdonald, and as yet no provision has been made for its inheritance by her only daughter.
