"As soon as I gained my liberty I went home determined not to be taken to that filthy cell again. I got my shotgun like any white American would and defended myself. The statement in the Journal that Bateman came to the gate is untrue, he stood back yelling and waving his arms. John Secrist, one of the force, was the one who approached the gate. But I had no intention of killing anyone, much less Secrist, whom I have known for 20 years, and who has always been one of my best friends.
