

### COMMENCEMENT

#### Exercises at Drain Institution Attended by Larger Crowd Than Ever.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)  
 Drain, Or., June 27.—Last evening at Normal hall the central Oregon State Normal school closed the most successful year's work of its history with one of the best-rendered programs of commencement exercises ever witnessed by the school.

An unusual amount of interest has been manifested by the public and each program has attracted larger crowds than could be accommodated in the hall. Last night's exercises were witnessed by over 1,000 persons, while several hundred were turned away. The exercises of the week began Sunday, June 23, with the graduating sermon by Rev. J. S. Handwerker of Corvallis. The subject was "The Open Door." It was a masterly address and scholarly effort.

The exercises for Monday evening were exceptionally fine and consisted of a cantata, "The Pioneers," rendered by the students.

**Class Day Exercises.**  
 The class day exercises took place Tuesday at 10:30 a. m. and at 2 p. m. of the same day occurred the field meet. Tuesday evening Professor J. B. Harner of the Oregon Agricultural college of Corvallis gave the annual address before the literary society. His lecture, "A Gallop on the Meditteranean," was illustrated with lantern slides. The pictures were taken by himself on his recent trip through Europe and Palestine and the lecture was highly instructive and rich in literary and historical associations.

The commencement exercises proper, which took place Wednesday evening, consisted of orations by the members of the graduating class and a most able and scholarly address by Senator O. P. Coshov of Roseburg.

The trust attorneys defied Landis yesterday when he asked for information, hence the subpoenas to get information first hand.

It develops that there are in existence five new indictments which have not figured in the conviction of the oil trust, containing 4,000 counts.
