

FELINE WENTY-THREE ARRIVES AT CENTRAL

Jailer Ben Branch Received Expected Addition to His Cat Gallery and Straightway Farmed It Out to a Chinaman for Latter's Little Daughter.

Ben was never satisfied with a name that did not suggest every trait and characteristic of the feline.

Only Loved One Cat.

Branch never really loved but one cat. Her name was Merely Mary Ann. Merely Mary only had one eye. The other she lost trying to eat up a dog. She was inside the rail during the 17 years of Mary's reign. She would sit on the ledge outside the station on sunny days and lay for unsuspecting dogs, and when she sprang she made her efforts count.

One day not long ago, Merely Mary died. The manner of her death was most unfortunate. While sleeping one Saturday night near the horse line, she berit while the patrol wagon stands, a riot call came in. The horses bounded out to the wagon and the harness fell. MINNERS DRIVEN OUT BY BENZE

Bulkheads Will Be Built in Healy Property at Butte to Confine Flames.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Butte, Mont., June 27.—Fire in the Minnie Healy copper mine has caused the suspension of mining operations and driven more than 300 miners to the surface, a number being partially overcome by the sulphurous fumes. Some of the miners in the lower tunnels became frantic and force was necessary to prevent their falling down the shaft when being hoisted to the surface.

The fumes pervaded the workings of the Leonard mine of the Amalgamated company, an adjoining property, and it was necessary to lay off one shift of several hundred men there. The fire is between the 600 and 800 foot levels. The managers are busily engaged in erecting bulkheads and state that they will be able to confine the fire and prevent its further spread as was done in the case of the St. Lawrence mine here, which has been burning for 22 years. The Minnie Healy mine was the property over which the famous Healy Amalgamated copper war began. It is now owned by the Butte Coalition company.

CHAPMAN ADDRESS WILL BE DISTRIBUTED

Earnest Efforts Are Being Made to Create More United and Definite Public Opinion in Opposition to Saloons Everywhere.

Stainless flag day will be observed by nearly every one of the evangelical churches of the city next Sunday. In this observance of the day ministers of Portland are cooperating with those of the state and with thousands of others throughout the United States, for this is no local agitation but a readily conceived and a widely acknowledged plan to create a more united and definite public opinion in opposition to the saloon.

RIGHT OF WAY NEEDED FOR SPUR TRACKAGE

O. R. & N. right of way officials are working on the task of securing right of way for the extension of the O. R. & N. spur to supply the stockyards of the Swift Packing house. The work is being delayed to a certain extent by the fact that the ordinance granting the right of way for the tunnel at the east end of the Steel bridge and across the peninsula has not yet been passed upon finally by the council and the mayor. To this action the ministerial association of this city agreed when Dr. Chapman was in the city and delivered his well remembered address. The Anti-Saloon league is distributing to ministers in Portland between 4,000 and 6,000 copies of Dr. Chapman's address. Some 15,000 copies are being sent out through the state.
