SPEED KINGS AFTER RECORDS

Automobile Races Will Be Full of Very Exciting Events.

OLDFIELD WILL TRY FOR FASTER MILE

Wallace and Siebel Will Also Cut Space Quicker—Corey to Appear in Farce Comedy on Track—Portland Famous for Speedy Course.

Everything is in readiness for the crack of the starter's pistol in the automobile races to be held at Irvington track July 3 under the auspices of the Third and Fourth of July committee. The recent experience gained by the various drivers has more fully equipped them for the races and record trials in which they take part.

Oldfield, Wallace and Siebel will be the king pins among the speed annihilators and their exhibitions and match races will be the feature of the excellent program which has been outlined.

The patriotic sweepstakes will be the big event, best out of three heats, and the event which will keep every person on the grounds on needle points for a few seconds will be Oldfield's attempt to establish a new mile record on the Portland track, considered now one of the best in the world.

After New Records.
Wallace and Siebel have tuned their big go-devils to the minute for their brush in the sweepstakes and for their drives in the free-for-all handicap race in which they enter. The novelty race is well filled and Corey, one of the stars of the last meet, has consented to give a special race which has never been seen before of "how not to run an automobile," and the chances are that a few spaces of fence will adorn the front part of his machine as he goes through the performance which was one of the features on the program at Los Angeles.

The Donation Derby of endurance is one of the big features. This will be a race for 50 miles in which it is expected that the world's record of 32:26.2-5 will be made. The prize is \$100; second, \$75; third, \$50.

Portland has attained a speed reputation and it is the intention of the management to keep it up. Never in the history of the automobile business has the sale of cars been as large as it was during the past week which has followed the racing events. There is no question but that automobile racing has a soothing after-effect.

Before the advent of the speed kings here, almost every automobile owner was willing to bet his hat that he possessed a car that could travel 99 miles an hour and took the opportunity to open her full force over every piece of smooth road in the state.
