

FAIRBANKS BOOM ASK LOW RATE BLACK AUDITOR CAUSE OF ALARM FOR FARM HANDS FRIEND OF TIP,

Christian Endeavorers Fear That Friends Will Abuse the Convention.

SEATTLE CANNOT BUY ENOUGH SILK TILES

Stringency in Market Causes Vice-President's Hosts to Decide Upon Sailor Caps as the Official Headgear for the Occasion.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)

Seattle, Wash., July 3 .- The fear that ome indiscreet person will arise while Vice-President Fairbanks is delivering his address before the Christian Endeavor convention and shout, waving his hat to air:

"Hurrah for Fairbanks, our next president!" is filling the souls of the members of the Christian Endeavor committee. Of course none of them will believe that Fairbanks himself would be a party to anything savoring of a boom for his aspirations, but they are fearful nevertheless.
"We invited the vice-president," said

Carl H. Reeves, secretary of the com-mittee, "because he is a Christian man. We are not fearful that he or his We are not fearful that he or his friends would take occasion to boom his quandidacy, but some unscrupulous persons might place rooters in the convention, which would be very unfortunate. If he should create a good impression the real work of the convention might be overlooked and the affair-turned into a Fairbanks demonstration."

Altogether the committee members are of the opinion that it is just as well that Fairbanks is a human icicle and not possessed of the magnetism of a Bryan or the flowery eloquence of Jim Han Lewis, thus lessening the chances of ill-spent enthusiasm.

The vice-president will not be greeted in silk hats and frock coats when he arrives in Seattle. A stringency in the tail tile market has caused the Christian Endeavor committee to abandon its original plans. Instead those who assemble to greet the tail icicle of the Wabash will appear in white sailor caps, 5,000 of which have been ordered for the occasion.
