SWIMMERS WILL CONTEST FOR HONORS

World's Champions to Paddle in the Water at Jamestown During Latter Part of July.

Norfolk, Va., July 3.—The Junior and senior national swimming and water polo championships to be held in the Grand Basin, Smith harbor, Discovery landing, between the government pier and Jamestown exposition, July 25, 26 and 27, 1907, will no doubt be the greatest swimming and water polo contest ever held in this country, or, in fact, any country, for there will be in competition on those three days the most famous swimmers in the world.

The positions of the various known body of water, "Grand Basin," are the best. The basin is 1,600 feet long and 200 feet wide, with a depth of 17 feet, and is kept filled with running water direct from Hampton Roads. There will be teams and members from all the large athletic clubs in the United States, including the great New York and Chicago, between whom there is a bitter rivalry.
