In this respect he has done us a great service and his name will ever be remembered in association with the awakening of the national spirit in India. "Everywhere protest meetings are being held in which the evils of the government are brought home to the minds of the masses, and there is a general cry to remove these evils. In fact the people, setting aside all their sectarian disputes, have been aroused to a sense of national freedom. "This is a favorable sign for the better prospects of India, and if this kind of agitation goes on for some time, day will certainly come when sheer loyalty will be considered disgrace and fighting for the right self-respect."

It is estimated that it will require \$1,700,000 to complete the project at the mouth of the Columbia, not including the proposed north jetty, upon which work has not yet been commenced. Other Expenditures. Following is a detailed statement of expenditures at mouth of river and harbor improvements in Western Oregon, of Columbia river above the mouth of the Willamette river, including Snake river, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1907: Coquille river, \$9,755.24; entrance to Coos bay and harbor, \$3,461.10; Tillamook bay and harbor, \$1,287.87; upper Columbia and Snake rivers, \$14,747.93; Columbia river between the foot of the Dalles rapids and the head of the Celilo falls, \$72,308.84; Columbia river at Cascades, \$1,975.01; Columbia river, Washington, \$11,988.88; surveys, etc., upper Columbia river and mouth of Snake, \$268.25; survey of Coos bay, \$747.56. Total, \$118,949.25. In commenting on these improvements, Colonel Hoessler says, in part, that the result accomplished to date along these improvements are: Coquille river—Completion of the south jetty to its projected length of 2,700 feet and its controlling depth of 1,200 feet of the north jetty. This has provided a new channel straight out to sea, the controlling bar depth being from six to nine feet at mean low tide. The jetties have suffered no material damage during the year, except that the encroachment at outer end has beaten down to some extent by seas. About \$60,000 is given as the amount required to finish this project, and this amount has been made available.

BETTER OUTLOOK FOR CHEHALIS COAL MINE

Sheldon Property Likely to Be Taken Into Strong Hands—Unequaled Shipping Facilities. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Chehalis, Wash., July 5.—The Collier firm in Seattle has been made agent for the coal mine property of G. Rosenthal located in this county. The mine here is at present operated by W. D. Sheldon, and he has been taking out from 20 to 40 tons of coal daily. The most of the coal is used in the manufacturing plants here and for domestic purposes. As soon as the mine is put on the market it is expected that local and other capitalists will take an interest in the property and sink other shafts with the purpose of developing a big coal mining business in town. The Sheldon mine is located in the northern part of the town, the bunkers being within 200 feet of the main line of the Northern Pacific. The survey of the mine is being made by the Portland-Seattle branch passes directly between the Northern Pacific tracks and the shaft of the mine, so that the very best of shipping facilities will be at the very door of the property.

SUIT MAY SETTLE SALARIES IN IDAHO

Boise, Ida., July 5.—Attorney Jesse B. Hawley of this city, it is reported, will bring suit in the supreme court on behalf of the seven district judges of Idaho, asking that each of them be allowed hereafter to collect the \$4,000 per annum salary fixed for district judges by the last session of the legislature. At that session a bill was passed raising the salaries of district judges from \$3,000 to \$4,000 each per year; also raising the salary of the state auditor and secretary of state. However, the auditor and secretary have not joined in this suit for increase. The state constitution provides that "until otherwise determined by legislative enactment" the salary of a district judge shall be \$3,000. Another and a more general section of the constitution provides that the salary of no elective official shall be increased during the term of office for which he was elected. It returns to the supreme court to reconcile these two sections.

FURNITURE CLEARANCE

An even dozen members of the furniture trust pleaded guilty before Judge Charles E. Wolverton in the United States district court this morning and were fined a total sum of \$5,550. In the investigation that followed, the plea it was shown that William Gadsby & Co. and the Edwards company were the prime movers in the furniture trust and were fined \$500 each, the largest fines assessed since the cases were brought into court. I. Gervutz & Sons, Taubenheimer & Schmeier Carpet & Furniture company, Fullerton Furniture company, Furniture company and Henry Jennings were fined \$250 each. Olds, Wortman & King were fined \$100. The Eastern Outfitting company, of Portland, and Edwin A. Covell were fined \$50 each. Upon motion of United States Attorney William C. Bristol, Judge Wolverton dismissed the government against George W. Abbott and Frank F. Freeman. It was shown that Freeman acted merely as an assistant secretary to the trust and that the government did not intend that any individuals should be indicted and Abbott's name was included in the indictment through an oversight. The proceedings this morning practically end the prosecution of the furniture trust and are a number of dealers to plead but they are of minor importance. This being the first prosecution against trusts in Oregon, it was thought that the government would be too severe with the dealers, but rather to teach them a lesson. Previous to the sentencing of the defendants, Assistant United States attorney James Cole outlined the policy of the trust and the manner in which it operated. He showed how the prices had been fixed and maintained, and how the trade had been restricted by the various associations. Several defendants told the court their part in the affair. All disclaimed any intent to defy the laws of the United States and claimed that the organization had been formed to protect themselves against practices which were hurting their business.

DROWNING OF TWO CHEMAMA STUDENTS

Girls in Picnic Party Go Into Willamette Beyond Depth—Third Narrowly Escapes. (Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, Or., July 5.—Two young girls, students at the Chemama Indian Training school, were drowned in the Willamette river yesterday near Lincoln, six miles from this city. Anna Jensen and Jennie Shustahagen, aged respectively 17 and 15 years, were the victims. Another girl, Mrs. Crider, narrowly escaped. She was rescued barely in time. The Indian girls were holding a picnic at a point near the school, and several of the teachers and employees of the institution were spending the day on the banks of the Willamette river. The girls had been swimming in the river, and were caught by a little too far and were caught by the undertow and borne down rapidly. Their cries caused the teachers and students to attempt their rescue but it was several minutes before John Spong, a local fisherman, saw the girls and went to their rescue. He was able to rescue Mrs. Crider, but the girls were drowned. A search was begun at once but it was not until 1:30 that the bodies of the two girls were discovered. All efforts at resuscitation proved futile. The bodies were found within a few feet of where they were last seen. The drowned girls had been students at the school for the past five years. They were from the village of Capilla, Alaska, and Jennie Shustahagen came from Juneau, Alaska. Assistant Superintendent Campbell was in charge of the search, and several of the school's cadets, who were attending the festivities here.
