Resignation Is Still in Hands of Department and New Appointee Has Not Yet Put in Appearance-Service Would Lose Valuable Member.

Several changes will be made in a day or two in the personnel of the immigration service here and at Astoria. Inspector Barbour announced this morning that Watchmen R. P. Bonham and Albert W. Long have been promoted to Chinese inspectors to be stationed at Astoria and that Watchman Victor Brandt will be transferred back to this

Inspector Bonham will take the place of former Inspector C. W. Larner, who has returned to this city after having left the service. Long will take the place now being filled by Victor Brandt, who has been acting in the capacity of inspector and watchman both for some

inspector and watchman both for some time.

The Chinese interpreter who was to come out here from St. Louis to fill the position now occupied by Seid Gain has not arrived yet and it is suspected that he will fail to materialize. Seid Gain, who is considered the best Chinese interpreter in the United States, and perfectly in the world was instructed to go terpreter in the United States, and perhaps in the world, was instructed to go to St. Louis when the general transfer was ordered throughout the United States, but he declined and flied his resignation instead, since he did not wish to remove from this city where he was born and raised, and where he has extensive business interests.

Seid's resignation has not been accepted yet and it is thought that it won't be since the service would thereby lose one of its most valuable men. Beid Gain is still holding his position in the inspector's office and Mr. Barbour hopes he will remain.
