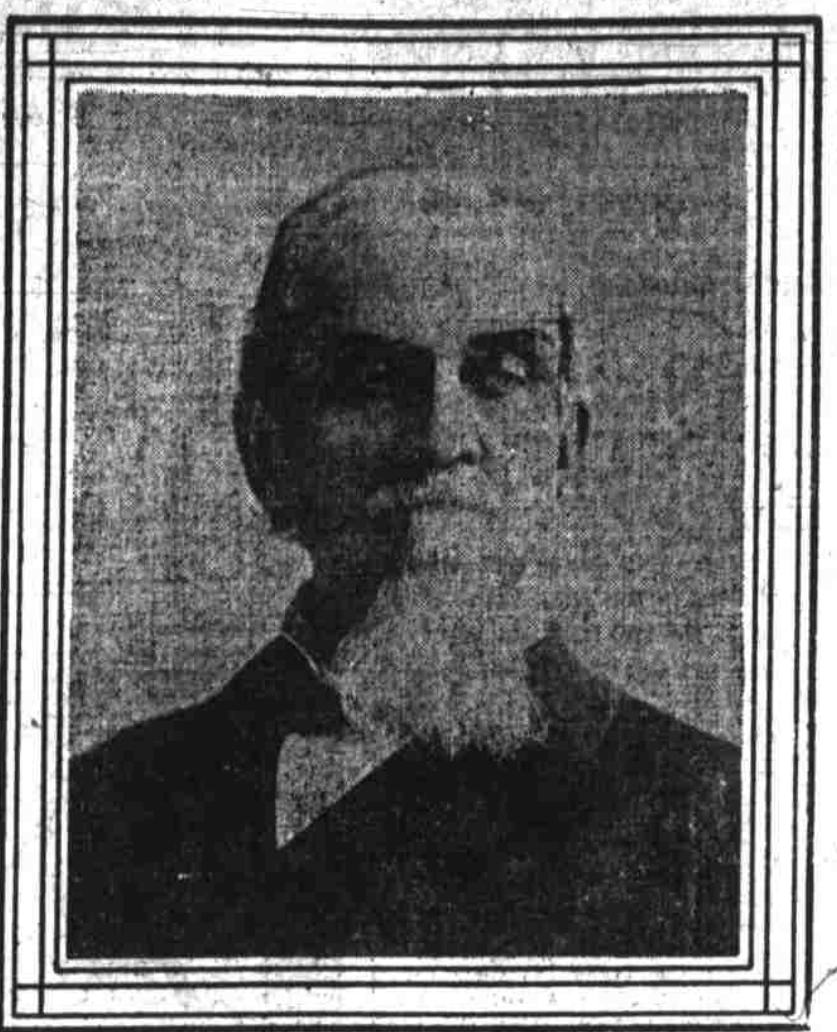


Blows Up Ship To Kill Enemy

Smuggler Lights Powder and Calmly Waits for Death Aboard Vessel.

(Journal Special Service.) Paris, July 6.—The circumstances under which the mysterious ship, the captain of which was Mofatt El Matari, a Tripoli smuggler, was blown up off the coast of Tunisia late on Tuesday night are as dramatic as they were tragic. The vessel, a brigantine, belonged to Chadir Ben Mohrah of Tripoli, and was bringing from the Piræus 600 barrels of powder and a considerable number of cases of arms, an attempt was made to land on the coast of Tripoli on Monday and Tuesday, but was prevented by the coast guards, who were keeping a sharp lookout. He then stood to sea, and made for the coast of Tunisia. Here the ship was sighted by Choucha, a Tunisian coast guard belonging to Zarzis, who at once sent 30 boats manned by 100 men—mostly fishers—in pursuit. The smaller craft stole under the cover of darkness through the silent sea, intending to lie back till sunrise, when a formal demand for "surrender" would be made. They were observed, however, by the ever-vigilant smuggler. Four French Spahis thereupon stood up, and demanded instant capitulation. "I am carrying a cargo of powder. You are helpless. Your lives are in my hands," was the captain's answer, and he swung a lighted torch over a dozen cases of powder which stood below. "If the coast guard Choucha wants to talk to me," he shouted through his palms, "let him come on board, but at the first step I'll send them all to kingdom come." Choucha, thinking the threat mere bluster, called upon his men to board the smuggler. No sooner did the men appear on a line with the deck, however, than Captain Matari, brandishing the torch, shouted: "You have asked for it. Here it is." He then threw the brand into the bow of the vessel, and calmly folded his arms across his breast. The explosion which followed was terrific. The vessel and nearly all the boats near it were blown into the air. A huge volume of water, like a tidal wave, swept to the shore, carrying in its track a number of people, six of whom were drowned. The total number of victims is 72—49 of whom were Tunisian sailors and three French Spahis. The crew of the smuggler numbered about 10.

Senator Pettus Celebrates Eighty-Sixth Birthday

(Journal Special Service.) Selma, Ala., July 6.—Senator Edmund W. Pettus, the oldest member of the United States senate, was 86 years old today. Senator Pettus still feels deeply the loss of his venerable friend, colleague and fellow-townsmen, Senator John T. Morgan, who recently passed away. The two had been lifelong associates, and Senator Pettus was probably the only intimate friend that Senator Morgan had in the senate. It is interesting to note that Senator Pettus is not only the oldest member of the senate, but also the oldest man in public life in the United States today. He was born two months after the death of Napoleon, while James Monroe was president of the United States. This was before the admission of Missouri to the union, and only two years after his own state of Alabama was created. He has watched the quadrennial battles of presidential elections 16 times since he reached his majority, and he has seen the union double in size from 23 states to 46.

Rockefeller's Standard Share

Wall Street News Agency Learns Oil King Holds Twenty-Seven Per Cent.

(Journal Special Service.) New York, July 6.—The Wall Street News Agency professes to have inside information as to exact holdings of John D. Rockefeller and other Standard Oil millionaires in the great corporation. It declares that 15 individuals and associates control the corporation and that John D. Rockefeller owns only 27 per cent of the stock. Popular impression has been that he owns about 40 per cent. According to the authority the dividends during the last 10 years are as follows:

To Distribute New Americans

Government Gathering Data to Aid in Placing Immigrants in New Homes.

(Journal Special Service.) Washington, July 6.—Governors of all states and territories including Porto Rico and Hawaii and national officers of labor unions, have been asked to furnish the division of information of the bureau of immigration with data that will aid the government in properly distributing newly admitted immigrants. The circular issued was prepared by Terrance V. Powderly, chief of the division of information. Powderly's circular to the labor union officers contains the following paragraph: "If you keep us informed of the local conditions of your territory, we shall be able to locate for them the best probable country of same we will know how to act, should applications be made to send laborers to a locality where industrial conditions are unsettled."

Pullman Company to Enlarge Its Plant

(Journal Special Service.) Chicago, July 6.—The management of the Pullman company is considering the advisability of using a portion of the company's \$10,000,000 or \$12,000,000 net earnings for the current year in the enlargement of its works, with a view to manufacturing an increased amount of standard equipment. This plan is said to be favored by the officials of the company, despite the fact that it may necessitate the holding of large quantities of equipment idle and unused during "lean" years of railroading, if such years come. It is stated that the company, which is earning such enormous net profits, is in a position to run the danger of an over-stocked plant in order to be ready to reap a harvest when the railroads are begging for equipment which can be procured at any price. The plant is now turning out an average of 100 freight cars per day. Formerly 50 passenger coaches a day were considered big business but now between 80 and 100 are turned out every 30 days.

Old World Comes to America for Grain

(Journal Special Service.) Chicago, July 6.—James Carruthers, a leading wheat exporter of Canada, with headquarters at Montreal, says: "We will have much higher prices because it is a world's market. We are now on an export basis and our wheat is selling freely. While the crop in eastern Canada is doing well, that just north of the international line is not doing so well. The crop is late and that is where we are certain to encounter some trouble in order to have a wheat crop in western Canada we must have an unusually favorable weather from this time forward. While I wouldn't care to go on record as saying just when I think the price of wheat will reach, I will say that a much higher level is certain, as the old world must come to this side, not only for wheat and flour, but for all other grains."

Tacoma Woman Disappears

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Tacoma, Wash., July 6.—Joseph Shoal, a Northern Pacific engineer, believes his wife has committed suicide. She left their home two days ago, leaving pathetic notes to several families of the neighborhood, giving directions for the disposal of her personal effects. The police say Shoal has been mistreating his wife.

Unknown Sailor Killed by Train

Tacoma, Wash., July 6.—A man having the appearance of a sailor was struck by a Northern Pacific passenger train a mile east of Prescott yesterday afternoon and instantly killed. There is a sharp curve in the railroad at the spot and the train was moving at a high speed before he was seen. He did not seem to be aware of his danger and was knocked 50 feet. His skull was terribly fractured. A box in his pocket contains the name, "O. Nicholson." The body is covered with tattoo marks. The coroner believes the man, who was dressed in rough clothing, was a sailor.

Divorce Will Not Separate Couple

(Journal Special Service.) Berlin, July 6.—Ike Rose, the husband of the famous dancer Saharet, has presented a petition for divorce in the German courts. Saharet also desires a divorce, which so far as can be foreseen, will ensue in due course. A curious feature of the suit is that the parties have concluded with each other a formal written contract regulating their mutual business relations after the divorce has taken place. This provides that Rose shall act as Saharet's impresario at a substantial salary.

News Forecast of Coming Week

Three Big Assemblies Will Attract Attention of Country Within Few Days. (Journal Special Service.) Washington, July 6.—With the president settled at Oyster Bay and the members of the cabinet and other high officials scattered to their homes throughout the country, the national capital has entered upon its customary period of midsummer dullness. Several large conventions will attract public attention during the week. The most important of these gatherings will be the International Christian Endeavor convention at Seattle, the annual convention of the National Educational association at Los Angeles and the triennial convocation of the Knights Templar at Saratoga. King Edward and Queen Alexandra will start Tuesday for a visit to Wales and Ireland, which will keep them away from England for about a week. Several events of interest to lovers of sport and athletics are scheduled for the week. The national amateur golf championship will be played over the links of the Euclid Golf club at Cleveland during the five days beginning Tuesday. The fourth annual tour of the Automobile Association of America for the Glidden and Howar trophies will start from Cleveland Wednesday and will end at New York two weeks later. The National Rifle association's meeting at Bixley Hill begins Monday and July 20, and the contestants will represent England, Canada, India, Australia and other portions of the British empire.

Novel is Clue to Murderer's Identity

Melbourne, July 6.—All the circumstances point to the fact that the murderer of Bernard Bauer, the diamond merchant, must have been known to his victim, who had perhaps even expected his visit. Mr. Bauer, it will be recalled, was found in his office one afternoon, slaying from fearful injuries. His watch and a few diamonds were missing, but the safe was unopened, and it is believed that the murderer must have been surprised in his search for booty and have hastily decamped. Earlier in the afternoon Mr. Bauer stated that he had an appointment at his office later. His seat commanded a view of the door of his office, so that no one could have entered that way without his notice. Further, a novel was found face down on the desk, which strengthens the indications that Mr. Bauer was not caught by surprise. The police are quite baffled at present to find any trace of the murderer.

Loving Couple Commit Suicide

Millionaire's Son and Wife of Friend Kill Themselves at Berlin.

(Journal Special Service.) Berlin, July 6.—A great sensation was caused in Berlin by the double suicide of Herr Francis Joseph and Frau Gotthelf. Herr Joseph, who was 31 years of age, was proprietor of a large manufacturing works, and heir to immense wealth, being the only son of a millionaire father. Frau Gotthelf, who was also 31 years of age, was the wife of the proprietor of a great exporting firm. Herr Gotthelf, who was 10 years older than his wife, frequently received Herr Joseph in his house as a guest, and what was apparently a warm friendship sprang up between the two men. OFFICERS AT VIENNA FIGHT DEADLY DUEL (Journal Special Service.) Vienna, July 6.—A terrible duel with fatal result was fought in the barracks at Trieste yesterday between two officers, Reserve-Lieutenant Herti and Lieutenant Wernik. A trumpery dispute which ended in high words was the cause, and heavy cavalry swords were chosen as the weapons. After fencing stubbornly for some minutes both combatants neglected the guard to reach out for a decisive blow. Lieutenant Herti brought his sword down on his opponent's forehead with great force, cutting partly through the skull, while at the same moment Lieutenant Wernik's point pierced Herti's heart, and he fell dead on the floor. Wernik's injury is serious but not fatal. The military authorities will hold an inquiry.
