

SOLID WEEK OF ENTERTAINMENTS

Medford to Hold Greatest Celebration Ever Attempted in Rogue River.

MUCH MONEY RAISED TO INSURE SUCCESS

State Horticultural Society and Business Men's Carnival Which Will Be Held Next Month Will Attract Thousands of Visitors.

Medford is preparing for the greatest celebration ever held in the Rogue River valley next month, when the State Horticultural society and the business men's carnival hold forth in the growing metropolis. Several thousand dollars have been raised by the committees in charge of the celebration, and Dr. C. R. Ray, a leading citizen of Medford, is at the Portland hotel securing attractions for the show. In speaking of the celebration Dr. Ray said:

"We will have one solid week of entertainments which will be along social and educational lines. The horticulture society will be in session August 6, 9 and 10, and delegates will attend from all parts of the state. The evenings the society is in session will be devoted to public meetings at which notable men from all sections will speak. We expect a crowd of 6,000 people and will provide entertainment suitable for all classes."

"The carnival features will be varied and the attractions will be the best we can secure. There will be rock-drilling contests, baseball games and other sports. Fireworks will form a portion of the display."

"Medford will be brilliantly illuminated at night. Three large arches with more than 1,000 electric lights on each will be erected, while nearly every business house in the city will decorate their buildings with electrical displays. No expense has been spared, and the people are determined that the carnival shall be the most elaborate ever held in southern Oregon."

"Medford has doubled in population in the last year and a half and will quadruple in the next five years. The growth is due to the great strides that are being made in the fruit industry. Between 3,000 and 4,000 acres of fruit have been laid out each year for the past five or six years. The care of these orchards and the handling of the fruit requires a small army of men, and the city is going up and new cities offer inducements to newcomers that we do."

"Another celebration to occur in Medford this year will be the visit of Secretary Garfield and party Sunday and Monday. All arrangements for his entertainment have been made and he will be given an opportunity to see the country from automobiles. He will arrive in Medford Sunday night and will be met by Mayor J. F. Redding and a party of prominent citizens. He will leave for the Washington officials to their hotel. A short reception will be held before retiring and the next morning a number of automobiles will carry the visitors around the country for several hours."

"They will then return to Medford and later start again in automobiles for Prospect on the road to Crater lake. They will continue their ride to Thrall where they will be met by their private car, which they will board and resume their journey south."

CHARTER AMENDMENTS NOW UP TO COUNCIL

Mayor Lane Says Legality Test Depends Entirely Upon Action of That Body.

"The sooner the city council declares the recent charter amendments to have passed the sooner the matter can be taken into the courts to test the legality of the issue and the sooner will the water department profit," said Mayor Lane at the water board meeting yesterday. The mayor explained that by resolution of council the proposed amendments were indorsed and then submitted to a vote of the people. The matter is one of utmost importance and it is to the interest of the people to see that the matter is brought up so that the legality can be tested and if affirmed work can immediately be commenced on the additional pipe line from Bull Run, for which \$1,000,000 was appropriated.

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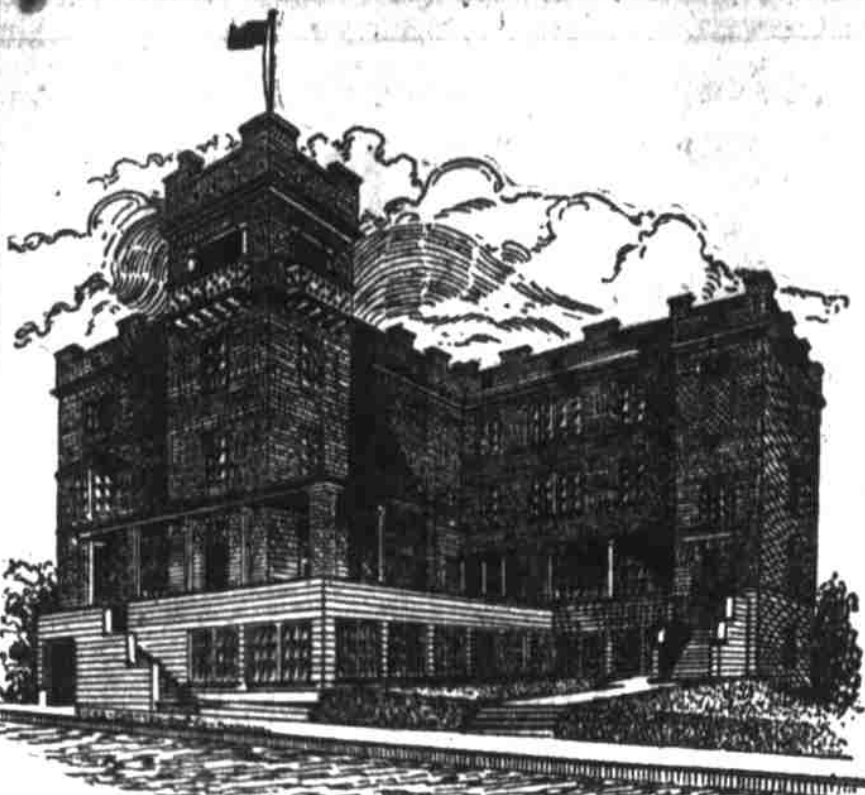

NOTED MEN AT MEETING OF BAR MASTER MASON

Seattle Lawyers Entertain Vice-President and Other Celebrities.

Seattle, July 11.—In attendance on the meeting of the state bar association, which begins in this city today, are more noted men than at any similar meeting for years. The gathering is the most noteworthy of its kind ever held in the northwest, and it is expected that its proceedings will be watched with interest by attorneys all over the coast. Pendleton, Ore., July 11.—One of the largest shipments of Lincoln rams ever to be brought to Oregon will be brought in from Canada early in September by the Cunningham Sheep & Land company. lamb, exclusively, and the 3,000 head will average from 130 to 180 pounds each, in weight. They are larger than ordinary yearlings although when they reach the county they will be but six and seven months old.
