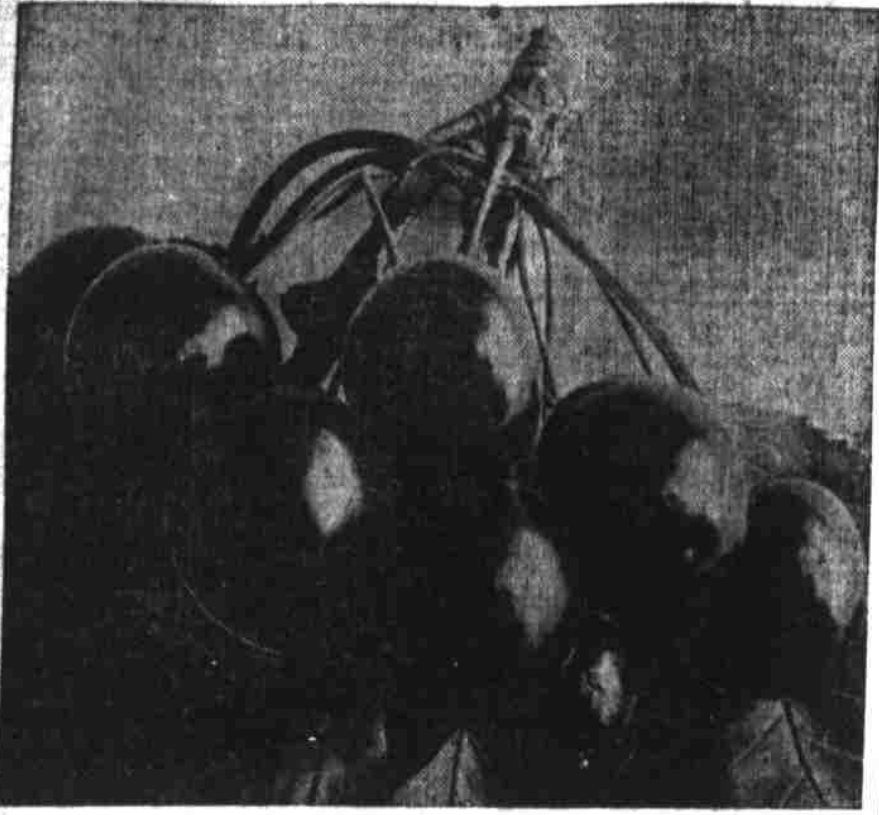


**LAMBERT CHERRIES RAISED

**RETAIL GROCERS' ASSOCIATION
SECURES THE LID FOR SABBATH**

District Attorney John Manning has met the request of the Retail Grocers' association, and beginning on Sunday next the Sunday closing law will be extended to cover the grocery business as well as the saloon business.

Some time ago the Grocers' association held a meeting and adopted resolutions which were sent to Mr. Manning asking that he cooperate with the association in its effort to enforce the Sunday Closing law as applicable to the grocery business. The district attorney has met the request and has issued instructions that no grocery store shall remain open on Sunday next or on any Sunday thereafter.

**FRUIT GROWER'S
LABOR PROBLEM**

Millard O. Lownsdale Advocates Importation of Foreign Workers.

NOT CHEAPNESS, BUT SUPPLY, IS THE CRY

Defies Hood River to Show Better Spitzberg Than Willamette Valley—At North Yakima Tree Men Meet Next—Officers Elected.

Salem, Or., July 12.—The convention of the Pacific Coast Association of Nurserymen will be held next year at North Yakima, Washington, and W. D. Ingalls of that city was elected president. The other officers are as follows: Secretary and Treasurer, C. A. Tonneson of Tacoma; vice-presidents, British Columbia, M. J. Henry of Vancouver; Oregon, A. Holaday of Scappoose; California, William Nelson of Fowler; Idaho, O. F. Smith of Blackfoot; Utah, P. A. Dix of Roy. The executive committee consists of the following: A. McGill of Salem, J. A. Stewart of Christopher, Washington, and A. W. McDonald of Tappanish, Washington.

President H. C. Atwell of the state horticultural society appointed a committee on the permanency of the Salem cherry fair, consisting of H. B. Thielson, J. K. Shepard and F. W. Power, which agrees the holding of the big horticultural event each year.

The Orchardist's Labor Problem.
One of the strongest speeches of the convention was that of Millard O. Lownsdale, the well-known apple grower of Lafayette, who spoke yesterday afternoon on "The Apple in Oregon."

The speaker said the changes in the labor conditions are such that it may be impossible to carry the fruit crops to a profitable harvest. He said that last year, because he could not obtain sufficient pickers, he left more than 10,000 boxes of apples on his trees and had to abandon the picking of marketable fruit because of the scarcity of pickers. To relieve this lack of pickers, the speaker said that while he did not believe in the importation of foreign laborers simply to cheapen the cost of production it would perhaps be necessary to resort to this, as the white laborers were unwilling to toil in the orchards. Necessarily orchardmen can not pay extravagant wages.

He suggested that the nurserymen should educate public sentiment to tolerate this cheaper class of labor in order that orchardmen may have at least a chance to succeed in their business.

"Public sentiment is the great factor in directing legislation," said he, "and it is to legislation and to treaty provisions that we must look for a solution of this vexing problem. There should be no struggle with the laborers because the laborers would confine themselves to work that Americans will not engage in."

Challenge to Hood River.
Mr. Lownsdale shot off a skyrocket that amazed the Hood Riverites when he shouted defiantly:
"I say to you, who know somewhat of the situation, and to you, visiting nurserymen, that no climate under the stars of God can produce a finer Spitzberg nor one truer to type than do we of the Willamette valley. If you don't believe this statement come to the Willamette valley apple fair next autumn."

Professor C. I. Lewis of the Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis spoke on the "Future of the Cherry on the Pacific coast." He said the Oregon cherry had all the essentials of a commercial cherry. It has strength, color, flavor and shipping qualities.

"If we can produce in large quantities and of uniform type we shall find a market for all the cherries we can produce. We must stand together and make this industry a success. No cherry which can not excel the best varieties we now have, and the improvement of the cherry is to be brought about by selection."

TERRIBLE FALL TAKEN UNHURT

Man, Woman and Team Go Over Precipice Near White Salmon, Washington.

Hood River, Or., July 12.—A frightful accident and most remarkable escape from death happened yesterday when H. J. Heinle, master for a firm of north bank railroad contractors, accompanied by his wife, was precipitated over a 300-foot embankment by an unmanageable team. The accident took place on the road leading up from the boat landing to the town of White Salmon. In endeavoring to pass another team on the narrow roadway Mr. Heinle started to back up sufficiently to let the approaching team pass, and the horse he was driving refused to respond to his command to stop and backed off the embankment. The vehicle rushed down the steep incline, dragging the horses after it, and turned over several times before bringing up against the heavy brush near its bottom. Both the occupants were hurled out of the carriage and sent flying many feet from each other. The horses, which were a team of bronchos, becoming detached from the carriage, rolled to the bottom, but when examined were apparently uninjured. Workmen who saw the accident and ran to the assistance of Mr. Heinle and his wife expected to find them killed or badly injured, but to their surprise they had escaped serious hurt, with the exception of being badly bruised and cut by stones which they struck in their descent. They were taken back up the roadway. It required the efforts of six men with ropes and other apparatus to get the damaged wagon and horses to a place of safety.

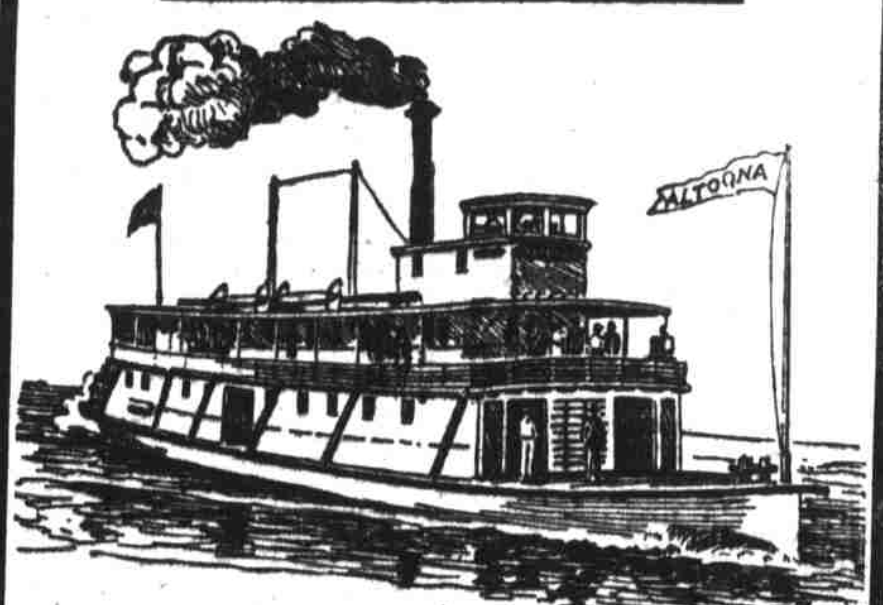

ANYBODY'S MONEY GOOD ON ROAD WORK

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Olympia, Wash., July 12.—In an opinion addressed to State Highway Commissioner Snow, Attorney-General Atkinson holds that road district aid for state highways may be either through taxation or private subscription. The law provides that 50 per cent of the cost of state highways shall be paid by the state and 50 per cent by the county, but 15 per cent shall be paid by the road district, especially benefited within the county. In some counties the county commissioners refuse to provide for this 15 per cent, but it has been tendered by private subscription. The attorney-general holds that if such private subscriptions are paid into the county treasury for that purpose the money can properly be applied on the construction of the state highway in lieu of money raised by taxation.
