FLYING STUMP HITS CARPENTER ON ROOF

B. Whistler Badly Bruised While at Work on House on Council Crest.
B. Whistler, a carpenter, residing at 292 Eleventh street, was the victim of a rather unusual accident yesterday morning and as a result lies in a precarious condition at his home suffering from a badly bruised back and possible internal injuries.
Whistler while at work on the roof of a dwelling on Council Crest was struck by a flying piece of stump that had been dislodged by a giant powder blast. The blasting operations were going on July 300 feet from the house on which Whistler was employed and it is presumed that the men engaged in the clearing work used too large an amount of explosive.
Whistler when struck fortunately fell into the building and thereby escaped being precipitated to the ground. A distance of 20 feet. Dr. Fred Gillette was called to attend the injured man and pronounced the injuries serious.

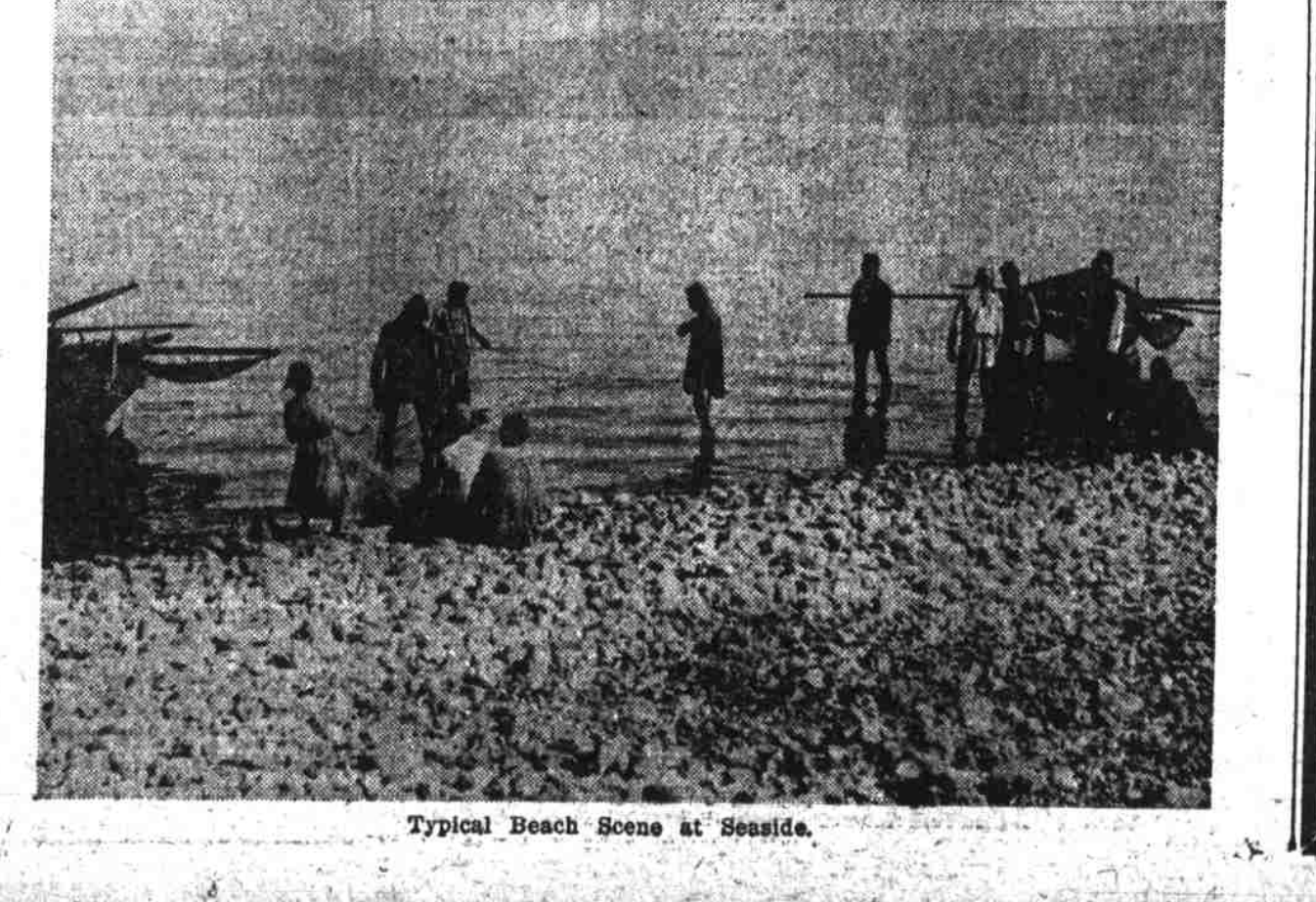
