San Francisco, July 15.—Charlie Parsons and P. C. Gehrardt, sprinters: Andrew Glarner, middle-distance runner; Herbert Cheek and Billy Powell, hurdlers; Al Plaw, Ralph Rose and William Gilmore, weight-throwers; Channing Hall, jumper; Fred Lanagan, polevaulter; Raleigh Kelly, distance runner, and Ollie Snedigar, all-around man.

These twelve sterling athletes will comprise the Olympic club track team which it is, at this writing, the intention to send to the Jamestown Exposition.

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
