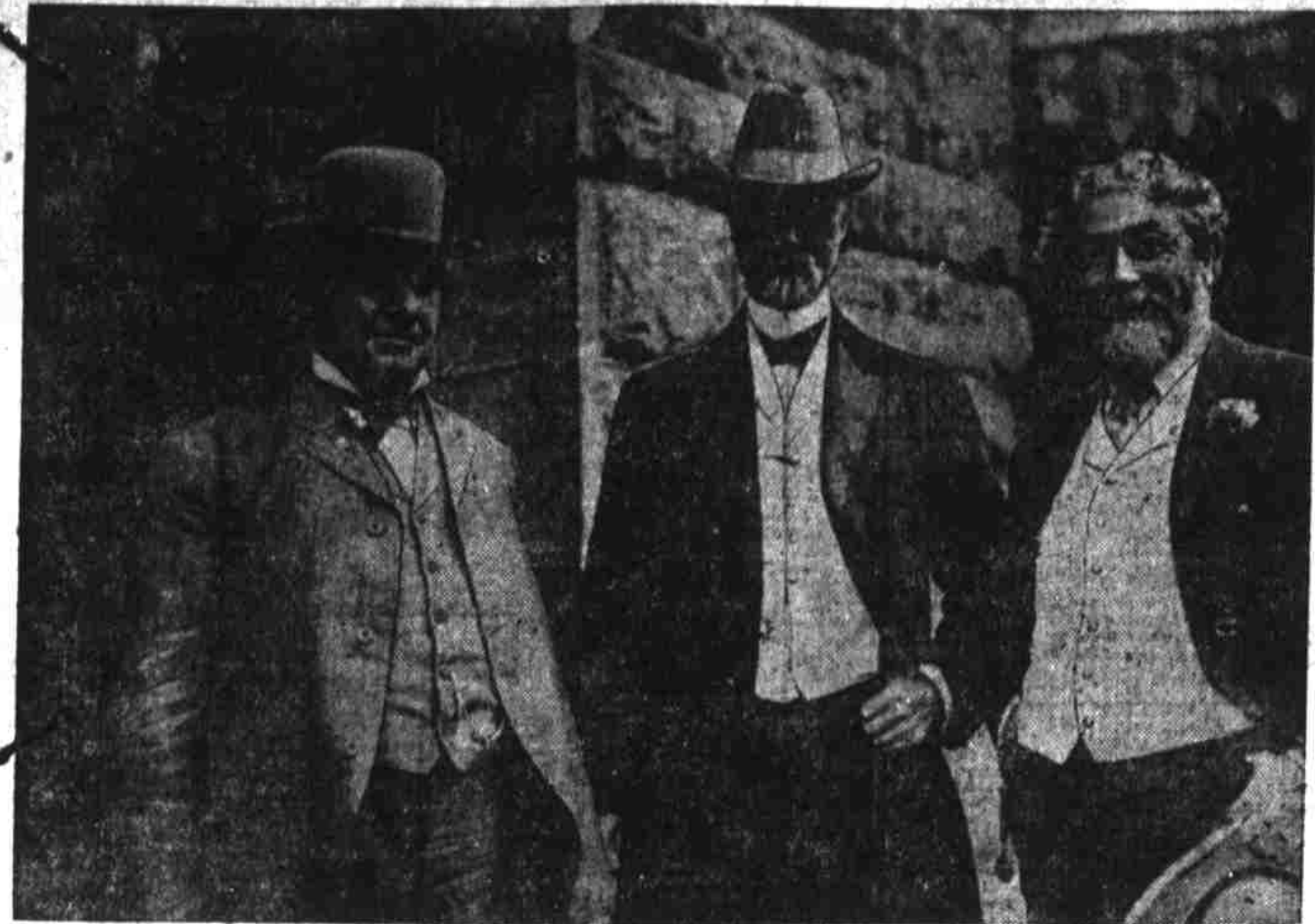


VICE-PRESIDENT HONOR GUEST OF CLUB

Charles Warren Fairbanks, vice-president of the United States, is on his way. This morning at 8:30 o'clock he left over the O. R. & N. for his home at Indianapolis, accompanied by his private secretary, Russell King.

Yesterday the second official of the nation spent an afternoon in Portland unofficially, coming simply as an American citizen unheralded.

The afternoon was passed quietly with a luncheon at the Arlington club with friends, in an automobile ride through the city and during the early evening at dinner with the members of the Portland Press club and their invited guests.

Press Club Dinner Feature.
The feature of the vice-president's visit to the city was the dinner tendered him as a distinguished American by the newspaper writers of the city. Impromptu in its inception and its arrangements, informal in its nature, it was the most successful function ever given in the city to a man of prominence.

At 6 o'clock the guest of the occasion was escorted from his apartments to the grill room of the Sargent hotel in the new 1904 automobile tendered for the purpose by Harry L. Keats, its owner, to be used in its initial run for the convenience of Mrs. Fairbanks. John L. Travis and O. Clark Letter, president and vice-president of the Press club, accompanied Mr. Fairbanks to the place of meeting.

Arrived at the Sargent the party was greeted with the strains of "Hail to the Chief," played by the executive committee of the Oregonian band, which had been sent from the Oaks by Manager D. C. Freeman in recognition of the distinguished visitor.

The long dining-room of the hotel Sargent had been profusely decorated for the occasion, with potted ferns, palms, flowers and flags while the cen-

ter of the board had been covered with sweetpeas banked about the bases of numberless candelabra, the shades of which were the national colors gracefully arranged. At the dinner no wine was served in deference to the guest of the evening.

Following the dinner John L. Travis, toastmaster of the evening, introduced Mayor Lane, who in a short and pleasing address welcomed the guest of honor to Portland. He was followed by the vice-president in a short talk earnestly and unaffectedly delivered.

Vice-President on the Press.

The theme of the speaker's remarks was the press of today and its power in public life, whether of the city, the state or the nation. The speaker lauded the general tone of the press and contended that it was an instrument for the public good which went in its power back of the executive, back of congress and back of the judiciary. Here and there, he contended, the press might be, and was, used as the instrument of personal aims and ambitions or to further selfish ends. In spots it might be touched with daubs of yellow, but this was the exception rather than the rule.

It was the duty of the working newspaper men of the nation, therefore, said the vice-president, to be true, earnest and honest in their work in order that their profession should reach up to its exalted mission as a mold of public opinion and a reflector of the common mind and latent of the nation.

Following the address by Mr. Fairbanks, short talks were made by Ex-Senator Fred W. Mulkey, E. W. Wright, James F. Tyler, John F. Carroll and C. E. S. Wood. OPENS NEW AND RICH DISTRICTS

Carver's Road Project Taken Up by Corvallis and Benton People.

LINE FROM CORVALLIS THIRTY-EIGHT MILES

Subscriptions for Amount of Stock Required Taken in One Week—Line Will Tap Magnificent Timber and Ranch Regions.

Corvallis, Or., July 17.—The information is at this hour given to the public that a new railroad scheme has just been launched in Benton county which will mean wonders to this section. The promoter is Stephen Carver of Chinook, Montana, formerly interested in the banking business at Ontario, Chinook and Harlem, Montana. He is also a large stockholder. He was the first successful bidder on the railroad between Medford and Crater lake. The sale was not, however, confirmed by the court and the road was later resold to other parties.

Carver made a proposition to Benton and Corvallis citizens that if they would raise \$30,000 of capital stock, he and his associates would subscribe a sufficient amount of stock to raise sufficient bonds to build and equip at least 25 miles of road from Corvallis in a southwesterly direction, skirting the foothills, through Bellefontaine and the headwaters of the south fork of the Alsea, and continue on to Blachly post-office in the Lake creek district, about 35 miles from Corvallis.

Prompt Response by Citizens.

The proposition was laid before Corvallis and Benton county citizens Saturday, July 6, when a general committee was appointed by the executive committee of the Commercial club. Meetings were called at various places throughout the county, and subcommittees appointed at Bellefontaine and in the Beaver creek section. On the following Saturday at 2 o'clock p. m. the required \$30,000 had been raised.

The railroad, it is estimated, would bring in tributary to the line at least 2,000,000,000 feet of the finest timber in Oregon, tapping the finest body of timber in the state; also the splendid grain, stock and fruit sections of the very prosperous country on both sides of the line.

Corvallis being at the head of water navigation, it is expected the road will bring a huge traffic this way. Articles of incorporation have been prepared and a meeting of stockholders called for Saturday, July 20, at 1 o'clock. An organization will then be perfected. A majority of the board of directors is to be selected from stock subscribers of Benton county.

Surveyors are already in the field. Rails are in transit to Corvallis and will be on the ground in a few days. It is the intention to complete the line to Bellefontaine before the winter rains. The county is wildly enthusiastic over the prospect and all point with pride to the energy of the citizens in subscribing the required stock in one week. The fulfillment of the plan will bring wonderful results to this section.

ERRING COUPLE SUFFER PENALTY

Hillsboro, Or., July 17.—Kate Bradley and T. J. Anderson, formerly of Portland, were arrested at midnight Monday night by Deputy Sheriff Kane on a warrant charging unlawful relations. Kate Bradley and her husband, George M. Bradley, formerly lived at Portland, but a few weeks ago the wife disappeared and since that time has been conducting a restaurant at Forest Grove with Anderson under the name of Johnson. Monday evening the husband came out from Portland armed with papers in a divorce suit he recently instituted in Multnomah county against his wife, and while on the train met Anderson. A quarrel ensued and a revolver was brought into play, but Bradley was disarmed and a terrific fist fight was indulged in.

Bradley stopped at Hillsboro and in company with Deputy Kane went to Forest Grove only to learn that the pair had departed. They were located at Banks, a small town 10 miles northwest of here. Bradley accompanied the officer when the arrest was made. He lives at Portland and is a miller by trade. The couple were placed in jail and were arraigned yesterday in circuit court.

Mrs. Bradley was given three months in the county jail and Anderson six months in the penitentiary.

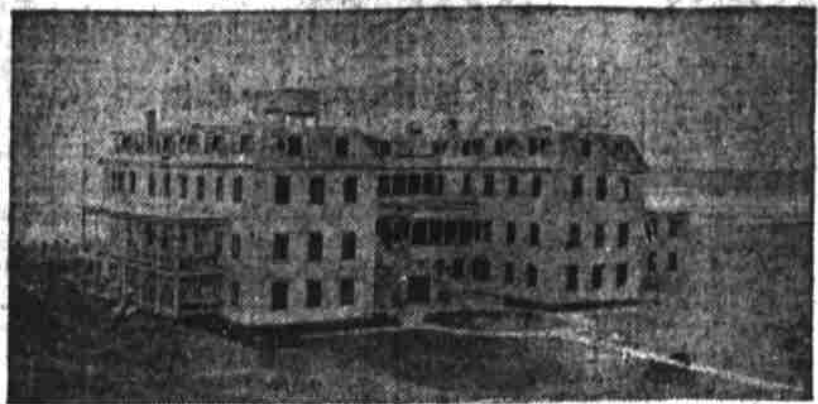

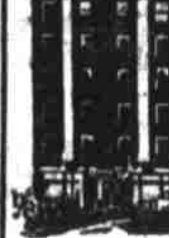

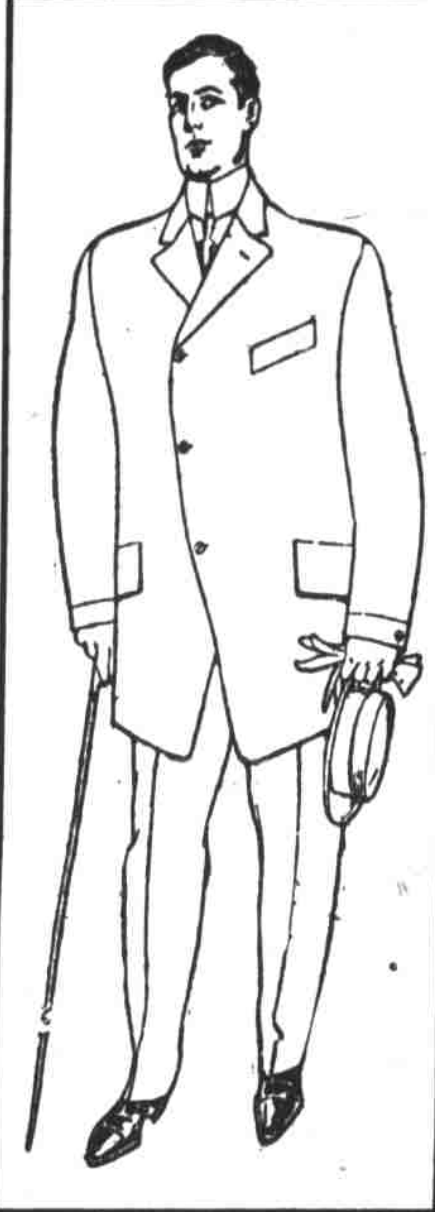
