

WON NEW BOATS WILL RLY COAST

Los Angeles Company Will
Operate Line of Steamers
Out of Portland.

VESSELS WILL RUN SOUTH FROM HERE

Arrangements Being Made to Open
Offices on Waterfront and Begin
Operations in Time to Handle
Some of Fall Trade.

Beginning in time to handle some of
the fall trade and transport a portion
of the season's shipment of grain, a
new line of steamers will begin plying
between this port and California, stop-
ping at Coos Bay, Eureka, San Francisco
and thence southward to Monterey and
Los Angeles.

While the name of the new company
enter this northern field has been
withheld for the present, arrangements
are being completed with one of the
steamship offices on the waterfront
where the business of the line will be
handled and negotiations with the new
agent who will take charge are being
carried on daily.

The California company at present
maintains offices in San Francisco, San
Pedro and Los Angeles, with headquar-
ters at the latter place. Two steamers
will be put on the northern run besides
tugboats owned by the company. Both
steamers carry about 700 tons of
freight, have passenger accommodations
for 50 persons and are equipped with
engines which will make a speedy run
between coast points.

It is stated that the new company is
establishing itself in Portland because
competition between San Francisco and
way points, where it is now engaged in
handling coast trade, has proved too
keen. It is the expectation that a big
business will originate in Portland dur-
ing the fall, especially in grain ship-
ments, indications pointing to an ex-
traordinary harvest in all sections of Oregon
and Washington.

Being in a position to operate the
entire length of the coast, the new local
company will be able to fill up at San
Francisco, what it fails to get coast-
wise. It is expected that final arrange-
ments for opening offices here will be
completed early next month, so that the
steamers can begin regular runs prior
to September 1.

BUILD NEW VESSELS

Hogquam Ship Yards Completing
Steamers for Coast Service.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Hogquam, Wash., July 19.—Much ac-
tivity prevails at the Mathews ship-
yard, which has the contract for sev-
eral steamers this season. The keel is
being laid for the steamer Tallac, a
sister steamer to the Shasta, which is
being called. Both vessels are for the
E. K. Wood Lumber company. The
steamer Saginaw, which they are build-
ing for the Hart-Wood Lumber com-
pany of Aberdeen is about ready to
have her deck laid. She is being built
under the supervision of Captain A. T.
Strawn, who gave up the command of
the steamer Quinalt to oversee the
construction of several boats for this
company.

The steamer William H. Murphy,
which was recently launched here, will
be towed to Aberdeen today and receive
a cargo of lumber at the American
mill, after which she will be towed to
San Francisco to receive her machinery.
This vessel and her sister steamer, the
Temple E. Dorr, both belong to the Pa-
cific Lumber company.

ALONG THE WATERFRONT

The steamer Breakwater is due to-
night from Coos Bay. She comes into
port heavily loaded with freight and
passengers.

Arrangements are being made by a
local firm to charter the Southern Pa-
cific steamer Clarina for grain. Definite
plans as yet have not been perfected.
Frank Waterhouse & Co. have the
Norwegian steamer Arcturion, No. 1,
arrived in port yesterday under char-
ter and will load her with lumber and
flour for oriental ports.

Cool as has been the weather at this
port during the present month, obser-
vations at the weather bureau show
that July's temperature is three degrees
in excess of the normal, the average
having been raised during the few days
of the first week when the thermome-
ter hovered around 80.

The Johan Poulsen is finishing load-
ing lumber at the Linnton docks today.
It is expected that she will be ready to
weigh anchor tomorrow and sail for
San Francisco.

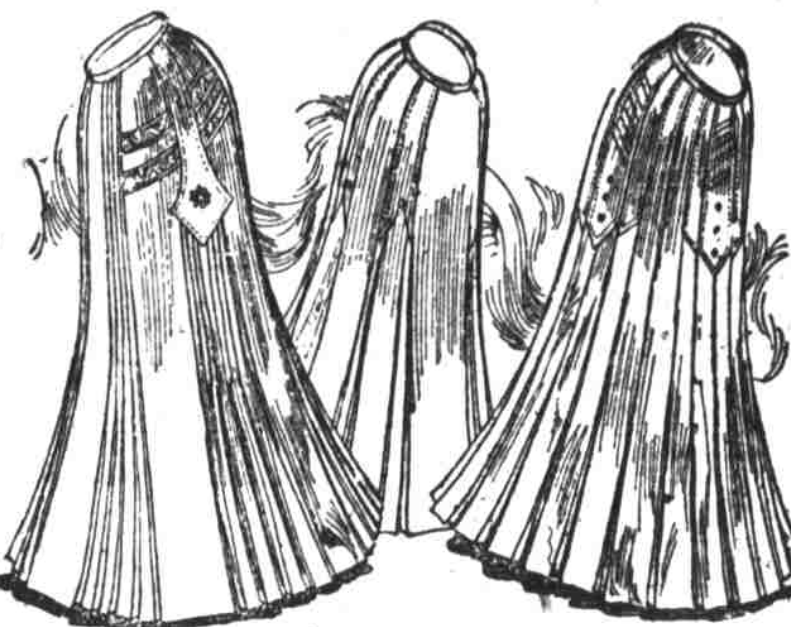
