Sharp Advances in Salt. Sharp Advances in Salt.

The sait market is again showing a sharp advance, due to manipulation by the big interests and to the shortage in supplies caused by labor scarcity. All grades of fine salt are advanced \$2 a ton while coarse and half-ground sait is \$1.50 a ton higher. These advances are among the largest seen in the salt market at one time in recent years and show clearly just how tight the interests have control of available supplies. At the new prices the market shows a wonderfully strong tone and there are some that are predicting still further gains in values. The new prices are now in effect.

Short Chittim Bark Peel.

Late news from the various chittim bark sections state that the peel is much lighter than expected. In this city the receipts are not a quarter of what they were a year ago and the peel at that time was very light owing to the labor scarcity. Chittim receivers say it is useless to expect men to go out into the forests and peel chittim bark at the prevailing prices when they can secure several times the reward by engaging in other occupations. Practically all the chittim being peeled this season is sent in by women and children who make considerable money in this way.
