# HIGHly DISPUTE TO REV. FULKES

Editorial Comment of the Interior on Appointment of Prominent Minister.

## DISTINGUISHED CALL IN CAPABLE HANDS

To Succeed to Pastorate of the First Presbyterian Church in Metropolitan Center of Oregon Heavy Tax of Responsibility, Says Organ.

Of Rev. William Hiram Foulkes, D. D., pastor of the First Presbyterian church of this city, the Interior recently said editorially: "To succeed to the pastorate of the"

foremost church in the metropolitan center of Oregon—one of the greatest churches of the west—at the threshold of the fourth decade of his age, and before the close of the first decade of his ministry, puts a heavy tax of responsibility on the young man to whom there comes such a distinguished call; but Portland has had no occasion to doubt either in the city or in the congregation that the new minister of the First Presbyterian church is capable of the load. A lifelong pastorate from youth to age, with increasing strength in every year, is the good promise of a work already well begun under the most excellent auspices.

Ministerial Heritage.  
"William Hiram Foulkes was born into a cumulative ministerial heritage, being fifth in a succession of preachers descending from the stanch old land of Wales. His father, Dr. William Foulkes, has for years been one of the leading factors of the synod of Kansas. The young man's native place was Quincy, Michigan; his raising was in Ohio and Kansas.

Ministerial Heritage.  
"Imports college, in the latter state, afforded him his literary education. Before he entered McCormick seminary he had year of power preaching at Burton, Kansas. While at McCormick he laid the foundations for the vigorous faith church in Chicago, but in spite of this extra burden laid upon him he gained the honors of his class, and upon graduating in 1891 received the Bernardine Orms Smith fellowship. Enabled thus to spend a year abroad, he and Mrs. Foulkes had the advantage of helpful study at Edinburgh.

"His first regular pastorate was in the country church of Scotch people at Elmira, Illinois, and thence he was called to the church at Clifton, Iowa, where after three years the call from Portland found him.

Interest in Mission Work.  
"The outstanding fact of Mr. Foulkes' ministry so far has been his remarkable success in awakening in his parishes a fervent zeal for foreign missions, but this specialism has not hindered his development in other pastoral capacities, and the trustees of the church have called the pastor of Portland First church is an "all-round man."

"Dr. Foulkes received his degree of B. A. from Emporia, Mo., 1897, and his B. A. degree in 1900. The degree of D. D. was recently conferred upon him by the Board of Trustees of the alma mater, Emporia, of Kansas, Lenox, Iowa, on the occasion of her golden jubilee and "Whitworth," thus honoring themselves and the man.

"Oregon, the Land of Opportunity," is the title of the 1908 pamphlet issued by the Portland chamber of commerce just off the press and ready for distribution. During the past few years the chamber of commerce has sent out many similar publications but the effort of the present year is far ahead of any similar publication.

The publication has 62 pages and is profusely illustrated with typical Oregon views ranging from the mountains and rugged spots of the state to the representation of the fruits and flowers grown within its borders. Included in the book is a map of the state upon the back of which is printed a resume of the land laws of the state for the information of those who contemplate coming from the east to make homes on the Pacific coast.

The chamber of commerce will send out 30,000 copies of this publication in answer to the inquiries which are constantly being received from every part of the country and even across the ocean.

The former work of the chamber of commerce in this line has proved good returns for the state and it is the intention of the organization to continue the campaign. The pamphlet of the next publication are already being considered, it being the intention to enlarge the size to 64 pages. During the remainder of the year it is the intention of the chamber to print pamphlets on subjects of interest from time to time for distribution as called for.
