Large shipments of peaches, oranges, lemons, a few apples and pears and all kinds of berries are arriving fast. Loganberries are hanging on as never before although few of good grade are coming in. Nearly 1,000 boxes of tomatoes were received today and the good tomatoes are beginning to arrive. Nearly all come from The Dailes but a few from other Columbia river points.

Valencia oranges are stiffer, the California prices having been advanced 25 cents. Lemons are also in demand. A carload of cantaloupes from Sherlock near Fresno arrived this morning. The Brawley supply has been exhausted. The former are selling \$3 and \$3.25 a crate. Oregon cantaloupes are selling from \$3.50 to \$4.50 a crate.

A train load of bananas has been delayed, causing a shortage in that fruit as also in apples and pears. There was a large amount of California Gravensteins on the steamship Columbia that the merchants were depending upon to supply the apple market. These were lost and the only apples now in the market are Oregon early apples.

There is a large supply of cucumbers in and they are very cheap. One merchant sold eggs yesterday at 21 cents, which would tend to show that eggs were not advancing. Poultry is not much better. Both in receipt are about equal to the demand as the commission men have notified shippers to hold until later.
