Following are supplies for the pulpit of the Seaside Presbyterian church, corner East Seventeenth and Spokane ave., during the absence of the pastor in the east July 28, morning and evening, Rev. Contractor L. D. Jackson has completed the deep cut on Sandy road, through Rose City Park, after moving about 10,000 cubic yards of sand and gravel. The Sandy road electric car line has been laid through the cut and a mile beyond. The cut is the full width of the street as laid out by the Rose City Park company, and it will be of immense benefit to the hundreds of farmers that use this road in coming to and from the city.

Rev. Paul Rader, who has been absent from his pulpit in the Hassalo Street Congregational church since July 1, on account of sickness, has been granted a further leave of absence until September 1. He and Mrs. Rader will spend the month of August in Tacoma. All services in this church will be discontinued during the month of August, except the mid-week service, which will be continued regularly every Thursday evening.

The Evangelical Sunday school convention opened yesterday morning at the camp ground at Jennings Lodge. Three questions, as follows, were discussed at the opening meeting: "What Do You Consider the Greatest Question in Connection With Our Sunday School Work?" "Qualifications for a Sunday School Teacher?" and "The Ideal Sunday School Work." The annual sermon was delivered last night by Rev. M. Heverling.

Thirty horsemen, truckmen and drivers are wanted by the Portland fire department to fill the complement for three new engine companies to be distributed throughout the city. The positions are worth from \$10 to \$30 per month and good strong men from 21 to 35 years of age are needed to fill them. The minimum height for men in these positions is five feet, six inches.

NEW JAIL SITE MAY BE SETTLED

Ninth and Davis Streets Seems to Be Favored Location.

A site for a new city jail and emergency hospital, which has been in the air for some time, will probably be settled at the next meeting of the council, a desire for a definite understanding coming up in the council meeting yesterday. There are some 17 bids submitted for a site and the council will be asked to select the most appropriate from among them.

Just at present expression seems to favor the location offered by the Moore Investment company at the corner of Ninth and Davis streets for \$40,000. A quarter of a block of ground is contained in the offer in addition to an excavation for a basement and an incomplete stone foundation which the council thinks can be used in the construction of the jail and hospital.

No action was taken by the council in regard to the Irvington district improvement matter, although the matter was brought up in the meeting and it will have to be threshed out in the street committee, to which it had been referred at a former meeting.

Councilman Bennett introduced his photograph ordinance, limiting the fire limits between the hours of 10 p. m. and 7 a. m.

An ordinance was also passed granting the Portland Fuel company the right to use a sidetrack on East Alder street to connect with its woodyards. The fuel company will have to construct a plank driveway on the south side of the tracks and keep it continually in repair.

LAMBERT CHERRIES ARE FINE SHIPPERS

Box of the Luscious Fruit Sent to Arkansas Arrives in Best State of Preservation.

Attorney Henry S. Westbrook of this city has demonstrated that the Lambert cherries are fine shippers. July 13 he expressed a box of Lambert's to his mother, who lives at Benton, Arkansas, 2,500 miles from Portland. Yesterday he received the following acknowledgment: "Benton, Ark., July 19.—The box of cherries came yesterday, were in fine shape. The most delicious box of fruit ever seen in this section."

BASEBALL GAMES WITHOUT LICENSE

At the meeting of the council yesterday afternoon an ordinance was introduced giving baseball teams the right to play in the city without license. This leaves baseball games out of the class of public exhibitions for which a license of \$10 per day or \$100 per year is asked. Last week Secretary Shepherd of the Portland team appeared before the council asking that an ordinance be passed fixing an annual license of \$2 in order that the club might be protected from prosecution under the exhibition ordinance. Councilman Conannon objected to the proposition of such a small license and when Vaughn moved that no license be imposed the motion was the first to second the motion.

SAVES GIRL FRIEND AND SCORPED MAN

Ethel Johnson Is Nearly Drowned in Struggle With Olaf Pearson.

Of the deeds of heroism performed by those who helped their drowning companions from the steamer Columbia, none is more genuinely impressive than the rescue of Effie Gordon and Olaf Pearson by 12-year-old Ethel Johnson.

All the more remarkable was the rescue because at the time the little heroine was using her utmost endeavors to keep her schoolgirl friend above water, she was clung about her neck by Olaf Pearson, who had plunged overboard without a life-preserver. Today he, too, owes his life to the child who fought desperately against her doubts but until all three were landed safely on a raft.

Ethel Johnson is a good swimmer. To that fact, and to the child's perseverance and courage, is due the successful culmination of her heroic rescue of two human beings.

The Johnson family became separated soon after the crash came. Ethel Johnson had strapped on a life-preserver and reached the upper deck alone. She waited a few minutes in the hopes of finding her mother or brother, then plunged overboard.

Striking feet foremost she sank to great depth and while still many feet in the water she felt the body of another person rising to the surface with her. Her companion was 18-year-old Effie Gordon.

No sooner had the two reached the surface when Ethel recognized the friend with whom she had been a classmate in one of the San Francisco public schools. She grasped her nearly exhausted friend about the neck and encouraged Effie to make every effort to keep afloat, while Ethel with the other arm and hand swam away from the sinking steamer.

The struggle for the lives of the two had hardly begun when Pearson, after plunging overboard, rose to the surface close at hand. He reached out and grasped the life-preserver strapped about Ethel.

"I told him to let go, that he would drag us all to the bottom," she said in relation to an unspoken story of the details of her heroic rescue. "But he told me he had no life-preserver on, and so I did the best I could to keep both of them from drowning."

The battle of the child heroine was crowned with success some time afterwards when she managed by a last desperate effort to reach the life raft upon which all three were taken.

Passengers on board the Elder said yesterday that Mrs. Gordon, from whom Effie became separated, reached the San Pedro in safety, but that when the latter began to sink the unfortunate woman was drowned in one of the vessel's staterooms. That she was kept from Effie during the entire trip north, and the husband and father is now endeavoring to learn whether Mrs. Gordon was lost or whether through some unfortunate circumstance she reached San Francisco safely.
